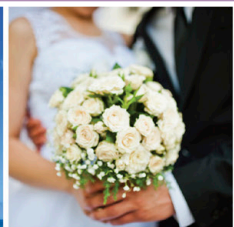

## PREFACE

The *Bermuda Digest of Statistics* was first produced in 1973. The publication provides an annual summary of various socio-economic statistics designed for convenient reference. The tables are grouped by theme to form a total of 10 sections. Unless otherwise stated, the statistics are for Bermuda.

The name of the department or organization whose reports or published statements were used is noted under each table. The assistance provided by these departments or organizations is acknowledged gratefully.

The figures in the Digest are mainly annual totals and totals for calendar months. Wherever possible, and space permitting, series have been provided for the period 2015 to 2024. Figures for earlier years may be found in previous editions of the Digest.

### COVID-19

The coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic led to restrictions being imposed by Government (e.g. curfews, limited group sizes, reduced business hours and temporary business closures), cancellations (e.g. cruises and flights) and changes in behavior (e.g. less desire to travel and dine out) as mitigation efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 commencing in 2020. Government's pandemic-related restrictions eased over the course of 2022 and ceased on November 30 that year. Therefore, readers should take the pandemic into account when interpreting the 2020 to 2022 data.

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## OVERVIEW

Note: Unless otherwise stated, facts and figures are for 2024.

### Section I – Population and Vital Statistics

Accounting for birth and death data subsequent to the 2016 Population and Housing Census, Bermuda's estimated year-end population continued to fall this past year to 63,179 (Table 1.1). For the seventh consecutive year, the number of deaths exceeded the number of births, resulting in a population decline of 177 (Table 1.1). The number of births decreased year-to-year by 3% to 425 for another record low since *Digest of Statistics* records began in 1940 (Table 1.7). Furthermore, the number of deaths fell by 3% to 602 (Table 1.7).

There were 329 marriages performed on island, an increase of 6% over the past year. The number of divorces filed declined by 8% to 125 while divorces granted remained the same at 85 (Table 1.7).

### Section II – Education

Total school enrolment decreased by 2% year-over-year to an unprecedented low of 8,289 students. Females comprised 49% of the public school system, 51% of private school pupils and 60% of Bermuda College students (Table 2.1).

Enrolment for Government schools fell 1%, making another record low, with declines recorded every year for the past decade. Private school enrolment increased by 1% whereas Bermuda College student figures dipped by 16% over the past year (Table 2.1).

Preschool enrolment increased by 14% as a result of gains for both private and public preschools (Table 2.5). Primary school enrolment declined by 1% to a record low (Table 2.2). Middle school enrolment decreased by 3%, reaching its lowest level since the inception of the middle school system in 1997 (Table 2.3). Secondary school enrolment rebounded from 2023's record low with a 1% increase (Table 2.4).

### Section III – Health

In 2022, deaths caused by neoplasms (cancers) represented the largest share of the total at 26%, aside from causes of death categorized as other. This was the most common cause of death for both males and females. COVID-19 caused 3% of all deaths in 2022 compared to 14% in 2021 (Table 3.1).

The number of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) reported decreased by 7% from the previous year. Forty-two per cent of all STIs were reported by persons in the 20-to-29-year age group. Of all patients, 62% were females. Chlamydia has been the most common STI since 1991; this past year it made up 74% of all cases (Table 3.2).



The number of immunizations for travel purposes for selected diseases increased by 11%. Typhoid was the leading vaccination recorded accounting for 29% of all travel immunizations (Table 3.3).

#### **Section IV – Labour**

From 2023 to 2024, there was an increase of 585 occupied jobs or 2%. The leading occupational group was Senior Officials and Managers, accounting for 21% of the total. Decreases in jobs occurred in one of the ten occupational groups, namely Elementary Occupations. Occupied jobs increased in all but three age groups: 20-24, 25-29 and 55-59 years (Table 4.1).

Standard Work Permits allow local organisations to employ foreign nationals if Bermudians, spouses of Bermudians or Permanent Resident Certificate holders are unqualified, unsuitable or unavailable. The total number of work permits issued to non-Bermudians who are not married to Bermudians increased by 10% year-to-year to a decade high. The vast majority of work permits were held in the private sector at 97%. The duration of “2-5 years” permits made up nearly half of all work permits issued for the private sector. For the public sector employees, work permits with a length of “2-5 years” also were the most common and comprised 66% of the total (Table 4.4).

#### **Section V – Prices and Wages**

Food retail prices rose for 29 of the 40 selected items for which data was available during the past year. Salt had the largest percentage increase in price while eggs had the largest percentage decrease year-to-year. Over the ten-year period, the greatest percentage increase was for peas and the only decrease was for boiled ham (Table 5.2).

There are 26 selected items across the 6 categories of Beverages, Household & Personal, Liquor & Tobacco, Fuel & Power, Transportation and Recreation & Entertainment. In the past year, 11 prices increased, 4 decreased, 10 remained unchanged and 1 was unavailable. Year-to-year, the largest percentage increase in price was for coffee and tea whereas toilet paper had the greatest percentage decrease. Over the past decade, the daily newspaper had the largest percentage increase while none of the 26 selected items decreased in price (Table 5.2 cont'd).

#### **Section VI – Finance**

Government revenue exceeded expenditure by an estimated \$19.7 million in fiscal year 2024/25, marking the first surplus since 2002/2003. Payroll tax remained the largest contributor to revenue at 49% while wages & salaries accounted for the largest share of expenditure at 35% (Table 6.1).

The Corporation of Hamilton total surplus of \$9.6 million in 2024 was the first surplus since 2016. Taxes and administrative and office expenses were the largest contributors to revenue and expenditure, respectively (Table 6.3).

The Corporation of St. George recorded a surplus of \$0.5 million, representing an 83% decrease year-to-year. The leading revenue and expenditure items were net wharfage which comprised 76% of revenue and staff and office expenses which represented 92% of expenditure (Table 6.4).

## **Section VII – External Trade**

The value of imports increased by 8% year-over-year. Fuels represented the largest annual growth at 50% whereas Transport Equipment had the largest percentage decrease at 17%. Finished Equipment was the largest commodity group as it comprised 23% of total imports (Table 7.1).

By country or region, the Caribbean had the largest percentage increase in the value of imports at 95% and Canada had the largest percentage decrease at 33%. The majority of imports were from the United States throughout the period; this year the share was 75%. (Table 7.2).

The value of goods exported over the past year more than tripled (Table 7.3). This year's value of \$68.3 million was the highest since 1971.

## **Section VIII – Transport**

The number of registered road vehicles increased by 1% this year to 50,560, surpassing 50,000 for the first time since 2009 (Table 8.1). For the fourth consecutive year, private cars comprised 46% of the total followed by motorcycles and scooters at 36% (Table 8.1). Public passenger road transport receipts increased by 21% but remained below pre-pandemic levels (Table 8.2).

Year-over-year, the number of reported road traffic accidents increased by 32% (Table 8.3). Private cars and motorcycles continued to be the leading vehicles involved in these accidents, respectively (Table 8.3). The leading known causes of accidents were inattention, inexperience and bad road surfaces, respectively. (Table 8.4).

Total road casualties rose by 22% during the past year (Table 8.5). Road traffic fatalities fell by 46% while serious road casualties increased by 12% (Table 8.5). Minor injuries increased by 26% and comprised 83% of total road casualties (Table 8.5). Traffic fatalities involving motorcycles made up 86% of the total (Table 8.6).

The arrival of overseas vessels increased by 22% this year. Yachts comprised two-thirds of the total whereas ships comprised the remaining one-third (Table 8.7).



## **Section IX – Visitor Arrivals**

Total visitor arrivals increased by 4% this past year but remained below pre-pandemic levels. Air visitor arrivals were 75% of the value in 2019 whereas cruise visitor arrivals were nearly the same as in 2019 (Table 9.1).

Cruise passengers comprised 72% of the 738,436 total visitor arrivals (Table 9.1). Cruise passenger arrivals were 2% higher than the previous year and peaked in July (Table 9.5). Residents from the United States accounted for 87% of all cruise visitors (Table 9.1).

Air visitor arrivals increased by 10% between 2023 and 2024 and July was the peak month (Table 9.5). United States residents represented 75% of air visitor arrivals (Table 9.1).

## **Section X – Miscellaneous**

The total value of selected domestic agricultural output increased by 14% over the past year to \$6.0 million (Table 10.1). Of this total, the value of vegetables comprised 87% (Table 10.1). Milk production increased by 3% from 2023's record low (Table 10.2).

The number of building permits issued decreased by 17% over the past year. Residential Permitted Development Permits were the most common type of building permit issued comprising 47% of the total (Table 10.5).

The number of completed dwelling units increased by 46% year-over-year. Two-bedroom units were the most popular type as they comprised 44% of completed dwelling units. The number of completed residential buildings rose by 4% with the most common type being detached houses representing 92% of the total (Table 10.6).

The Bermuda Fire and Rescue Service recorded a 2% decrease in the number of calls received by their dispatch centre this year. Sixty-one per cent of these calls were emergency medical service dispatches sent to the hospital while the remainder were fire dispatches (Table 10.7).

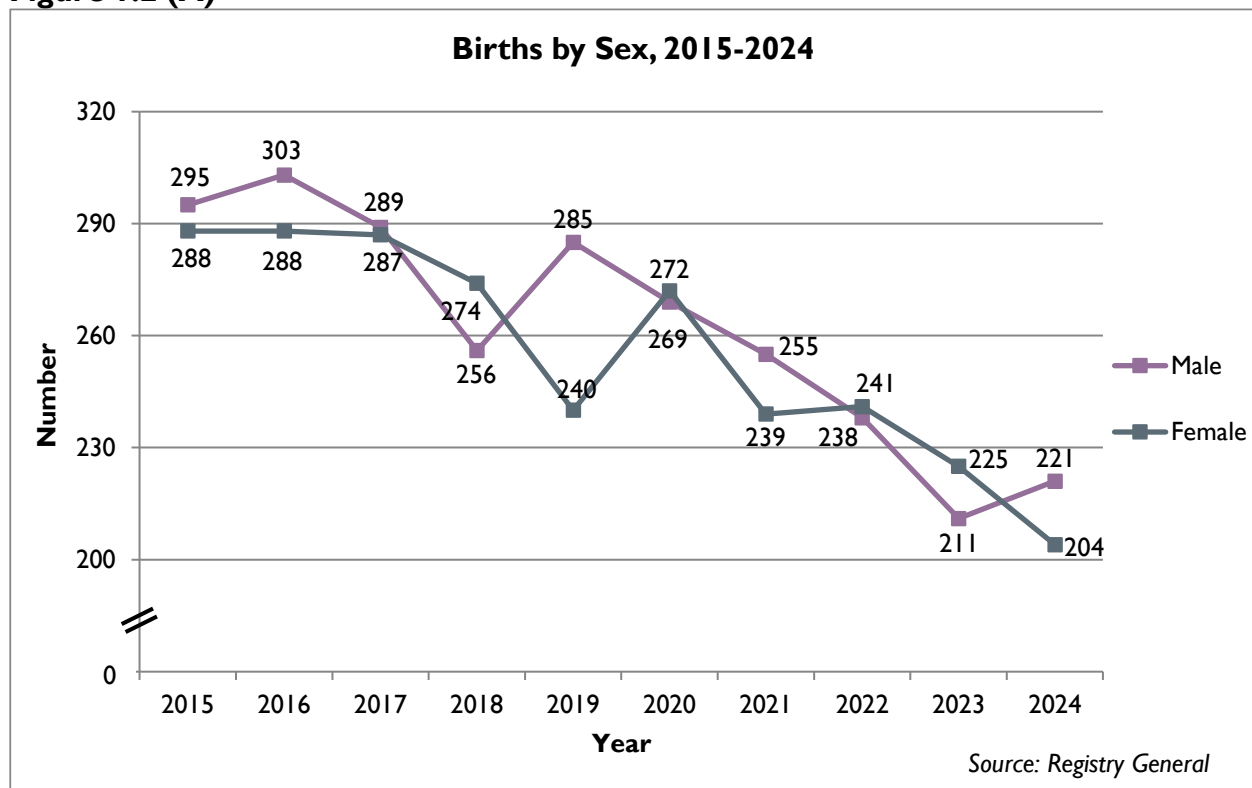

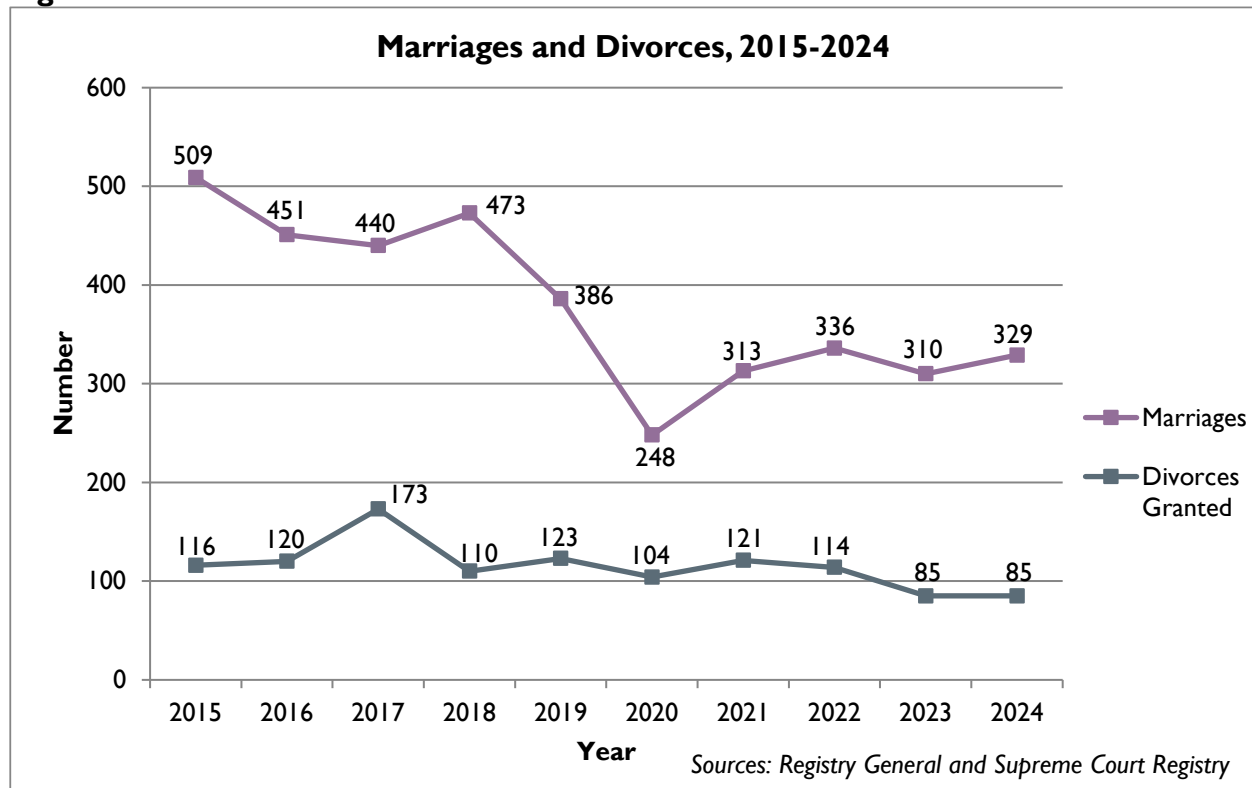

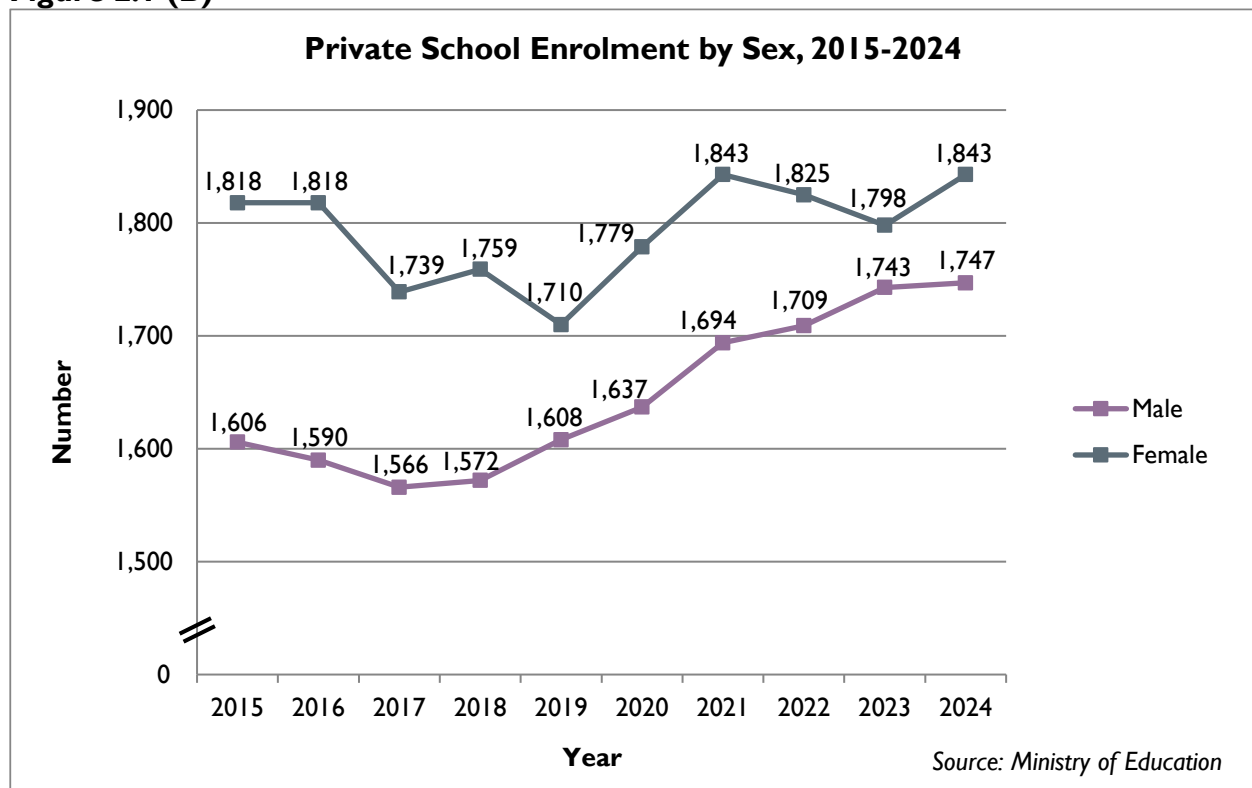
**Figure 2.1**



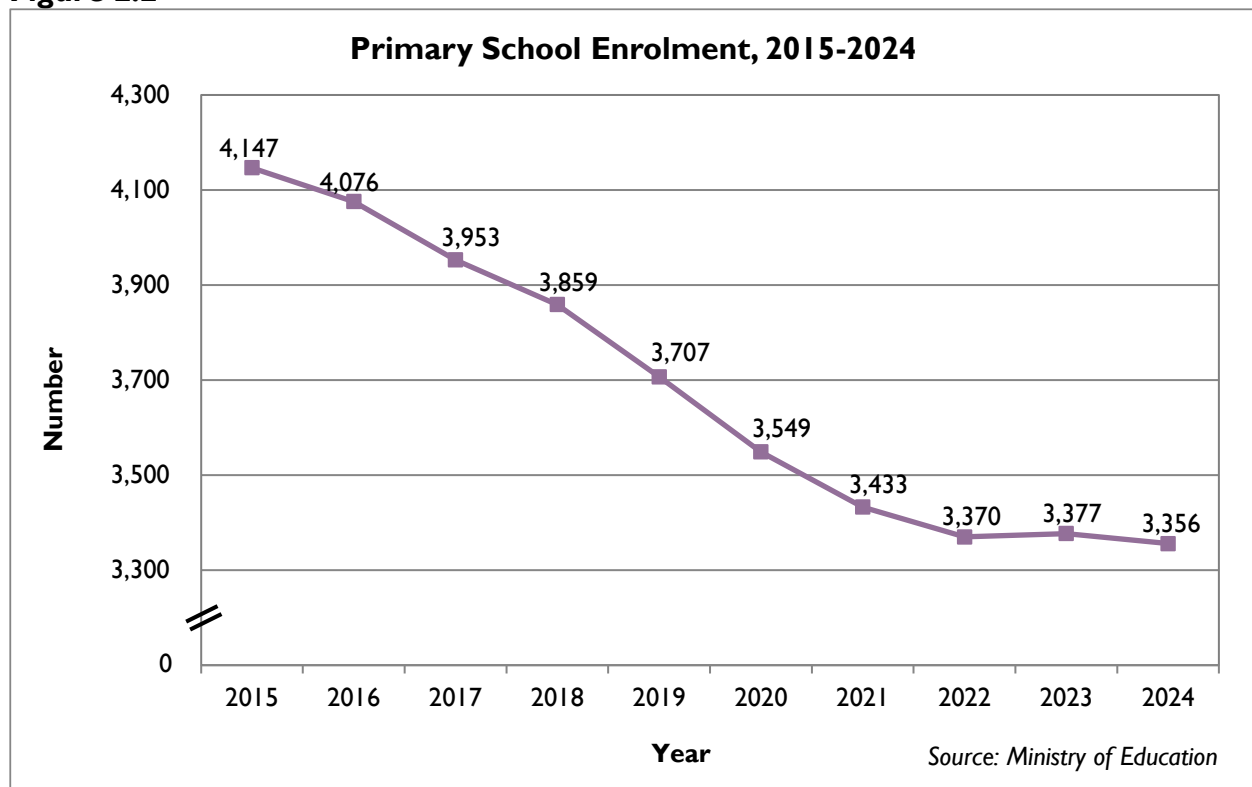
**Figure 2.1 (A)**



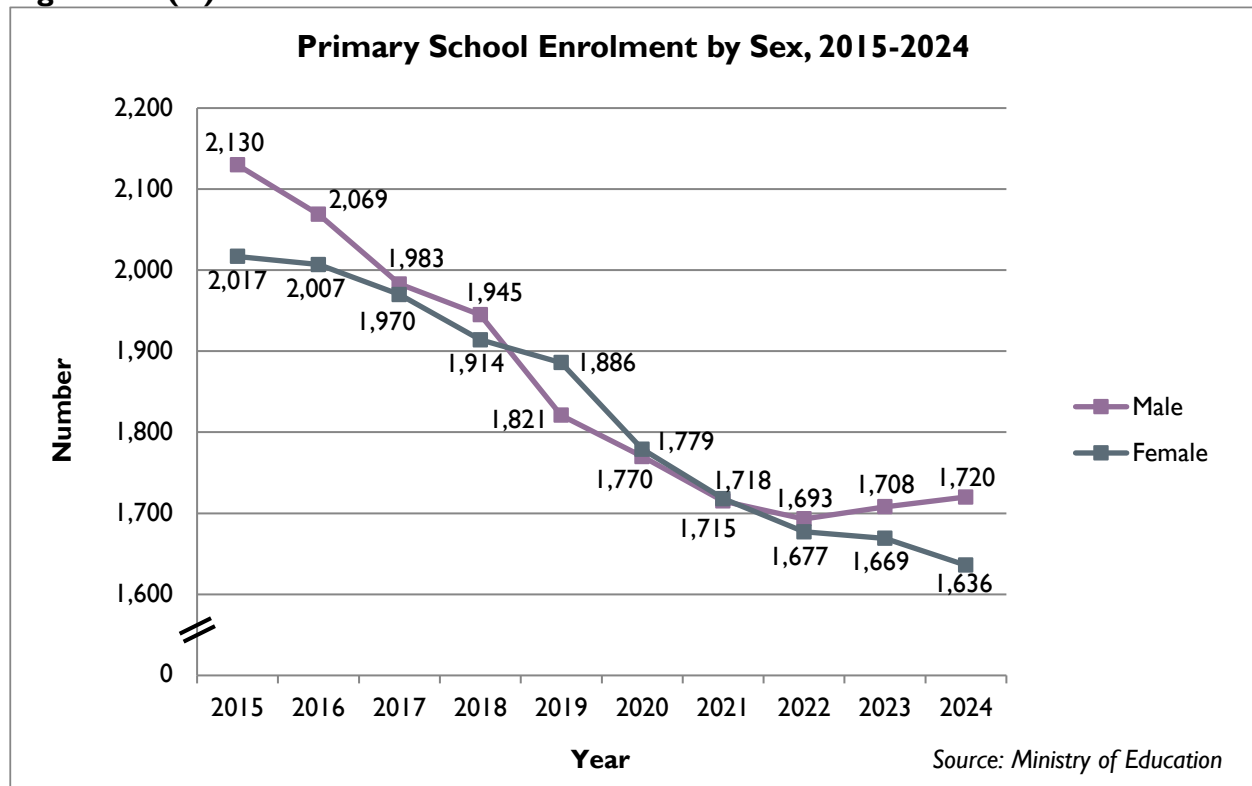
**Figure 2.1 (B)**



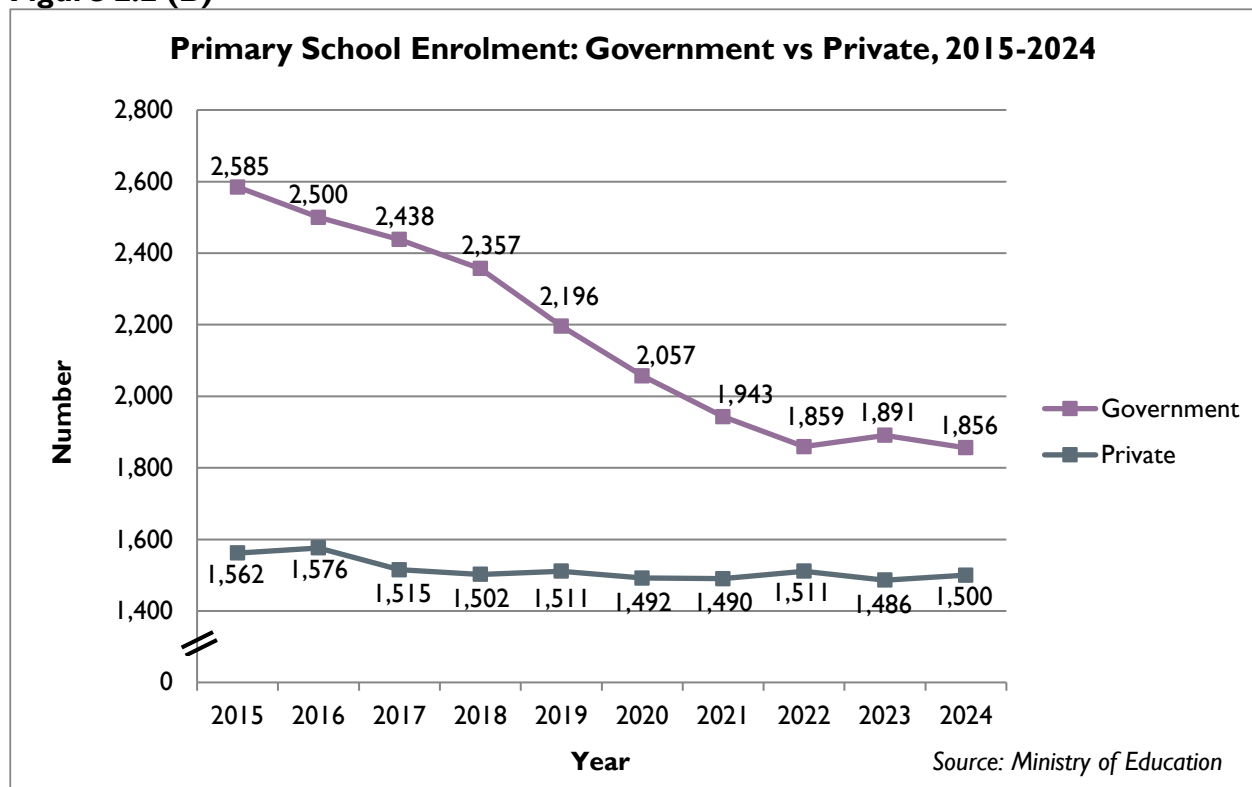
**Figure 2.2**



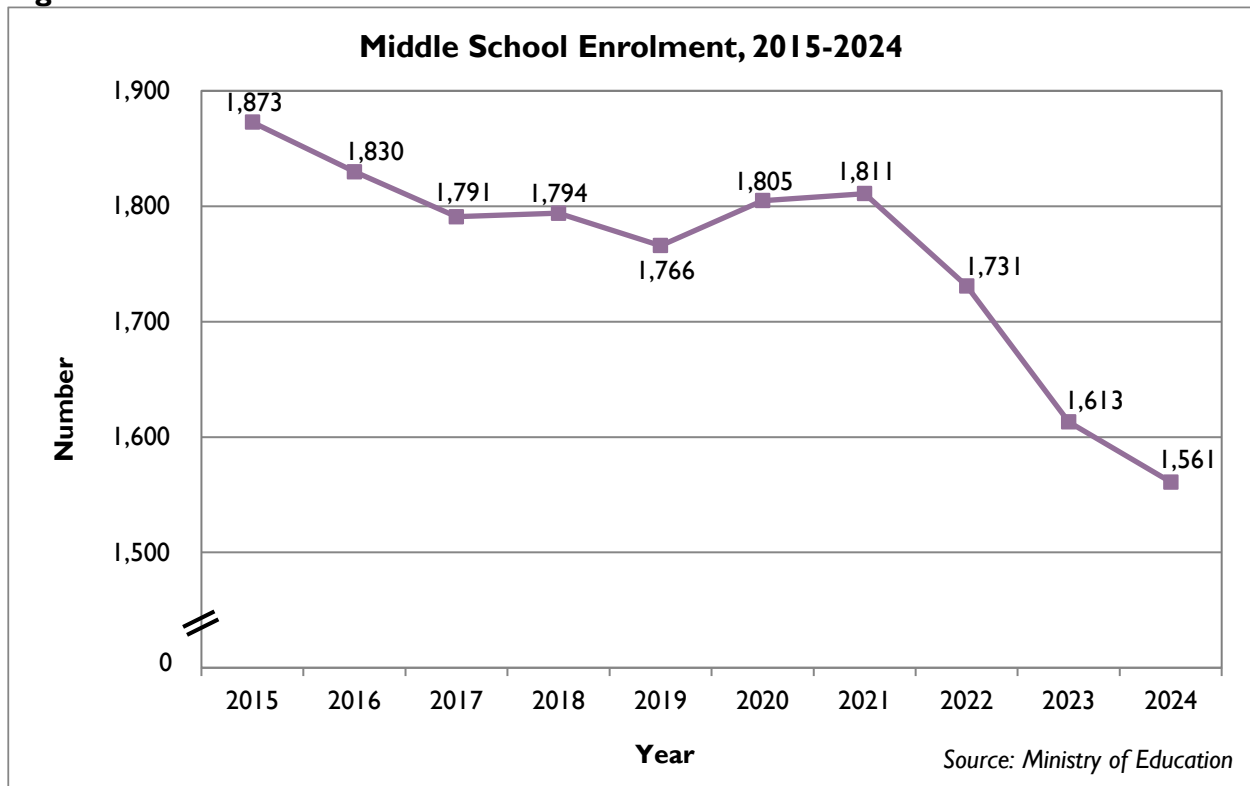
**Figure 2.2 (A)**



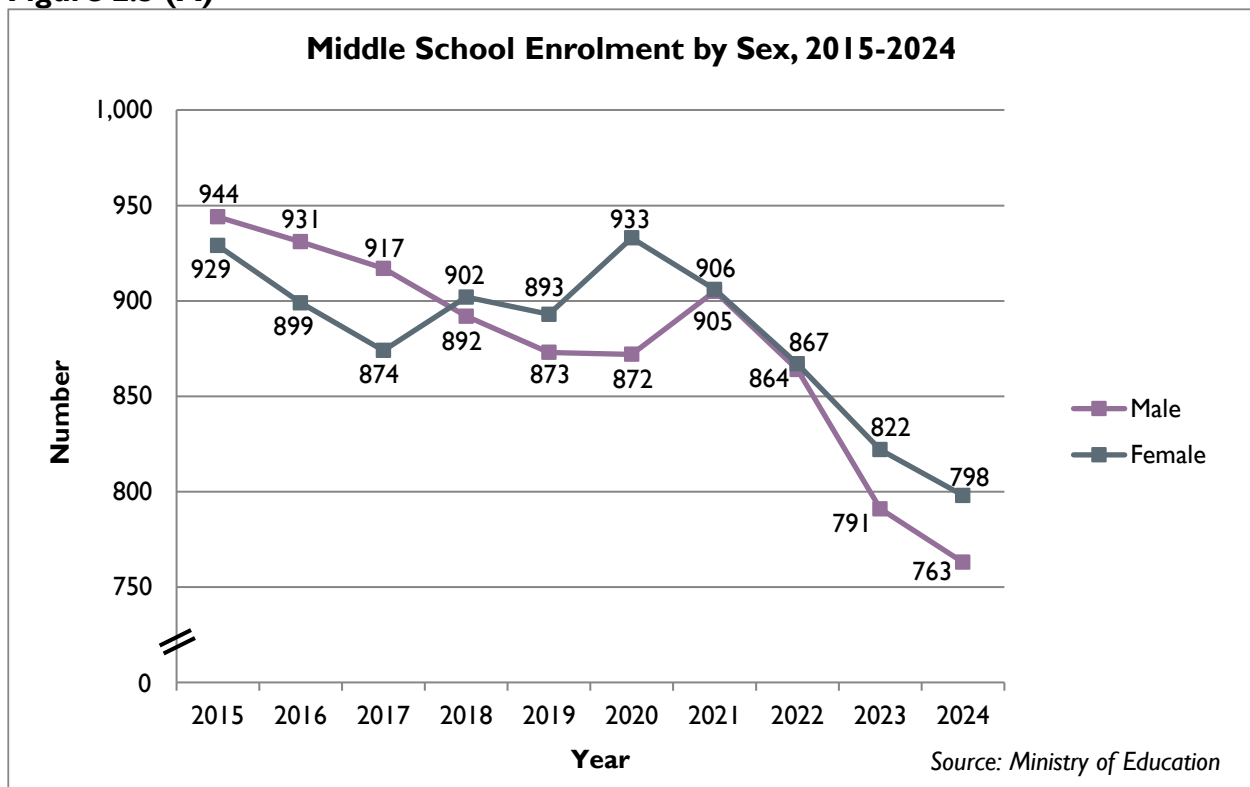
**Figure 2.2 (B)**



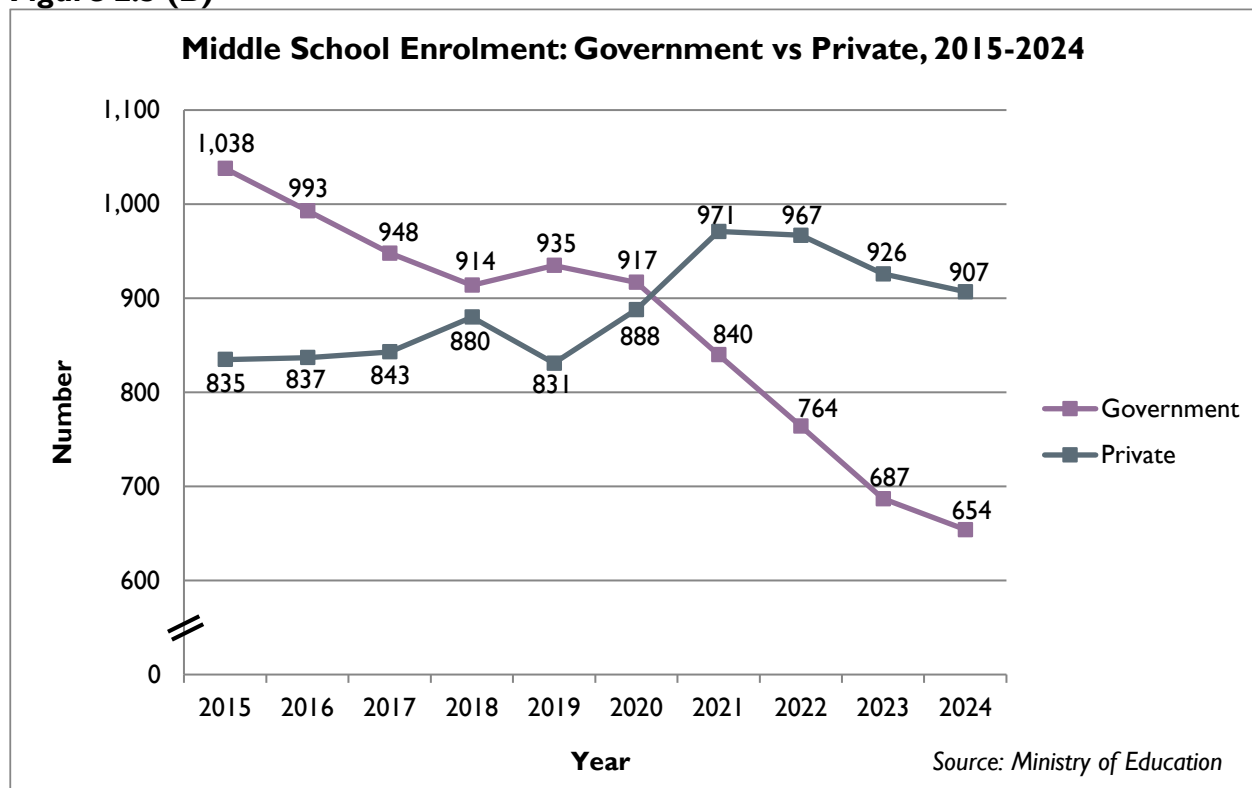
**Figure 2.3**



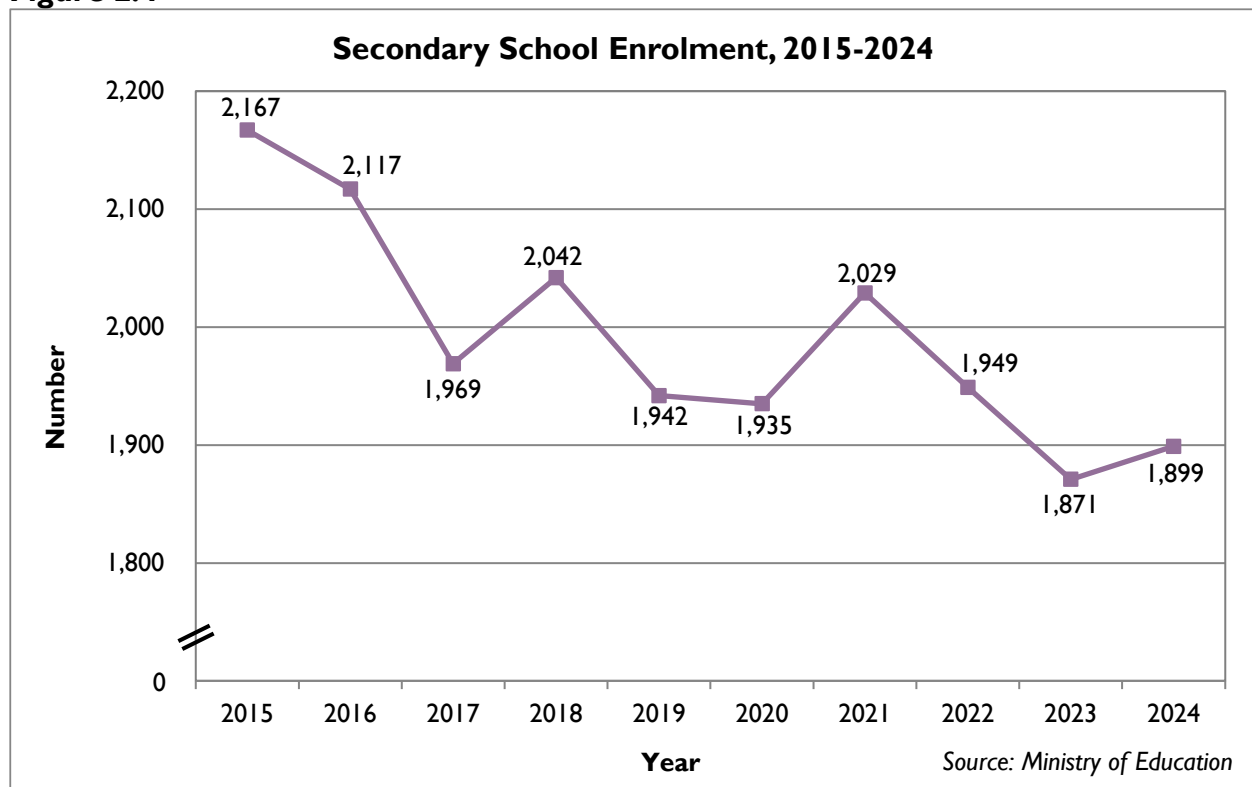
**Figure 2.3 (A)**



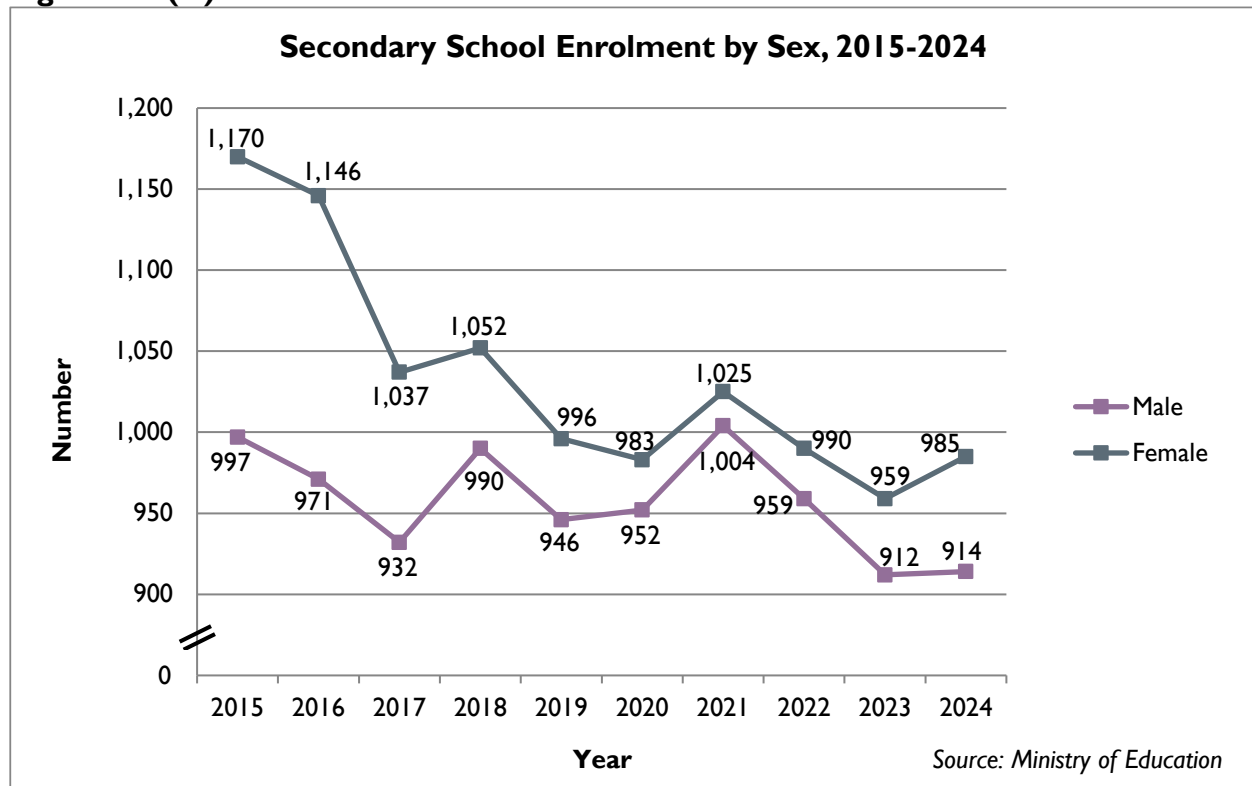
**Figure 2.3 (B)**



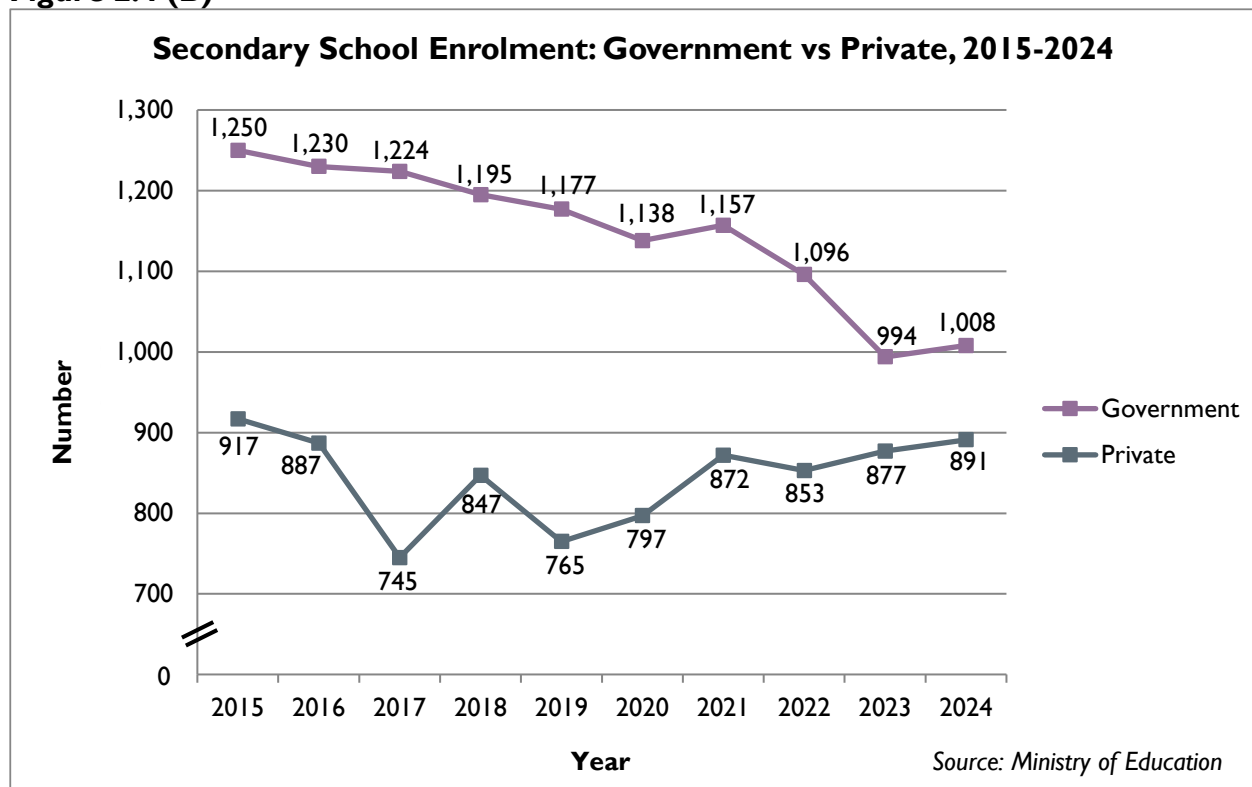
**Figure 2.4**

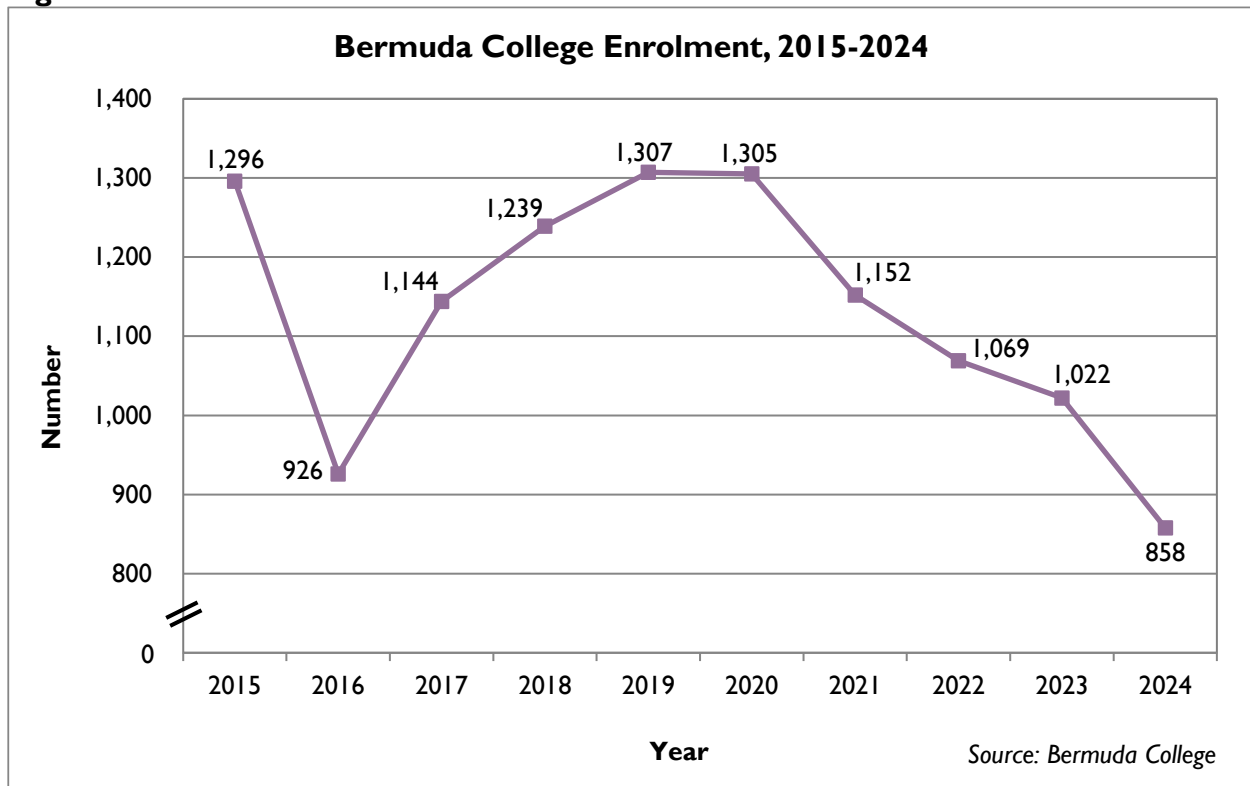


**Figure 2.4 (B)**

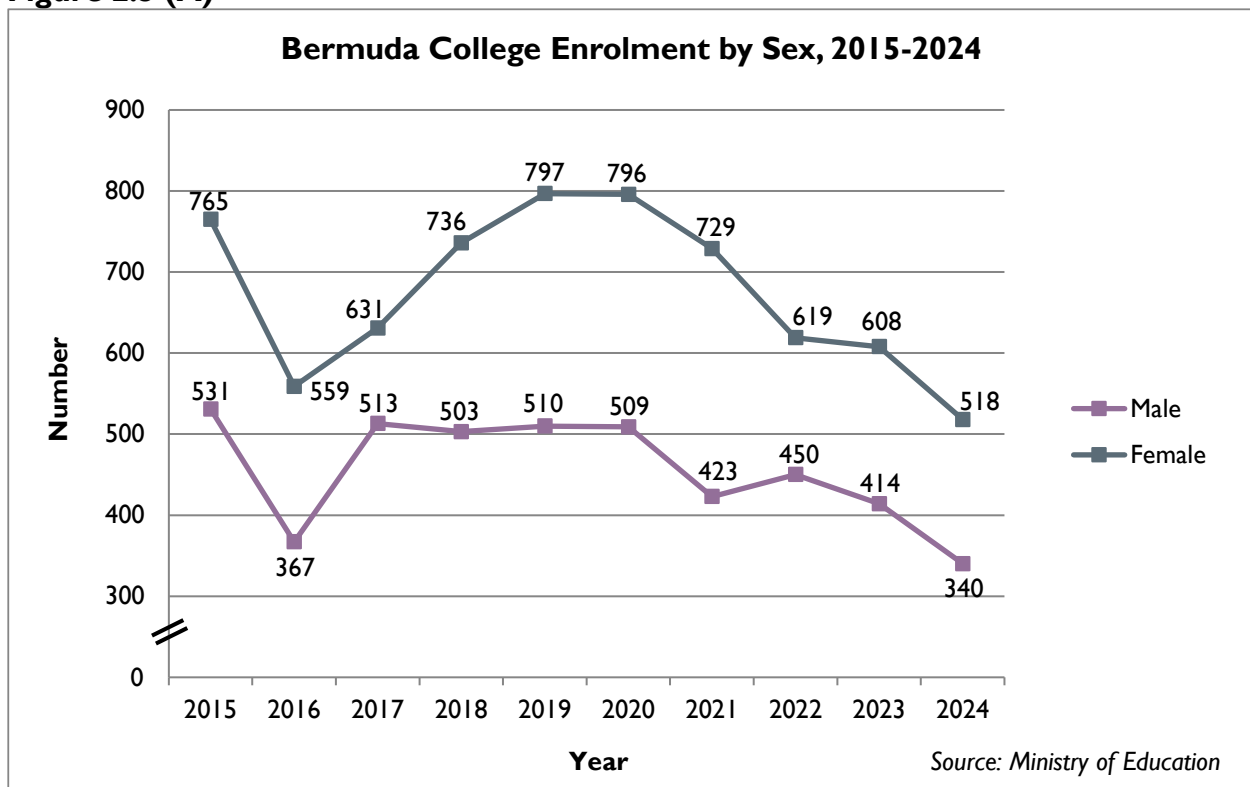




**Figure 2.5**

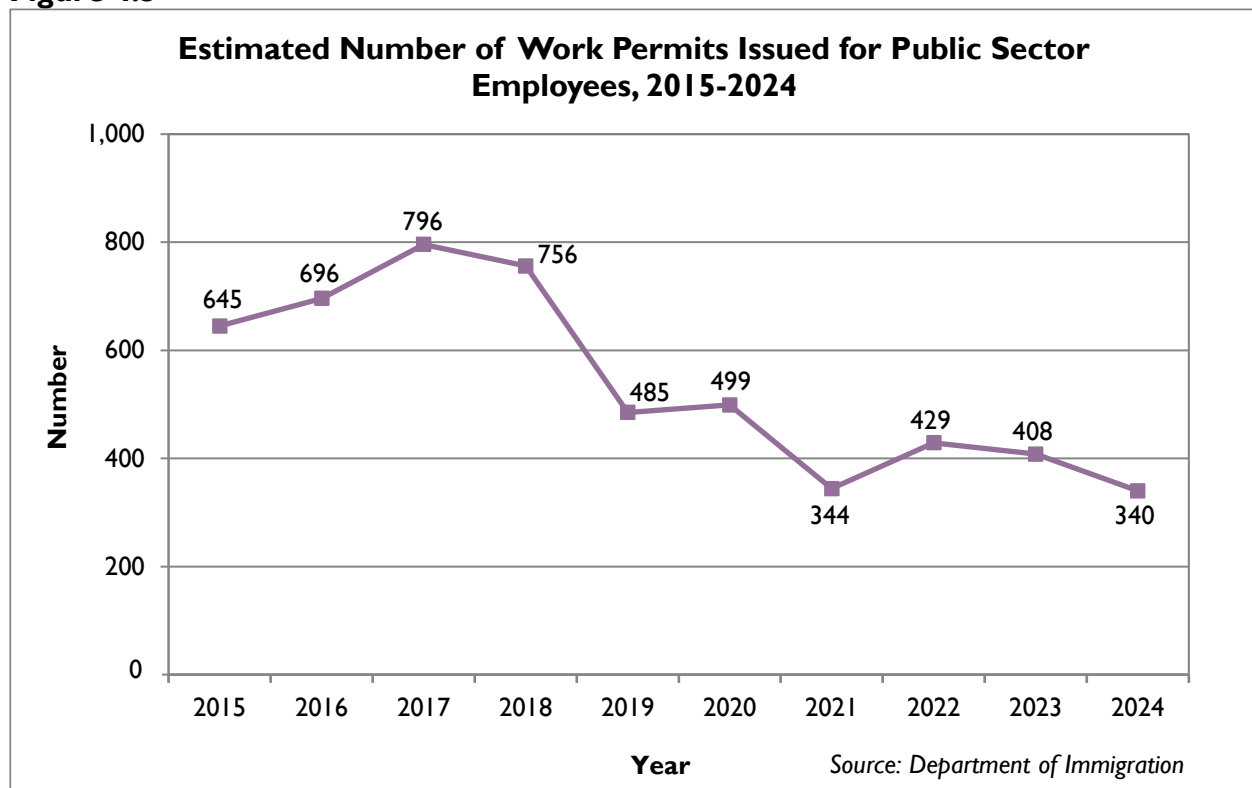


**Figure 4.2**

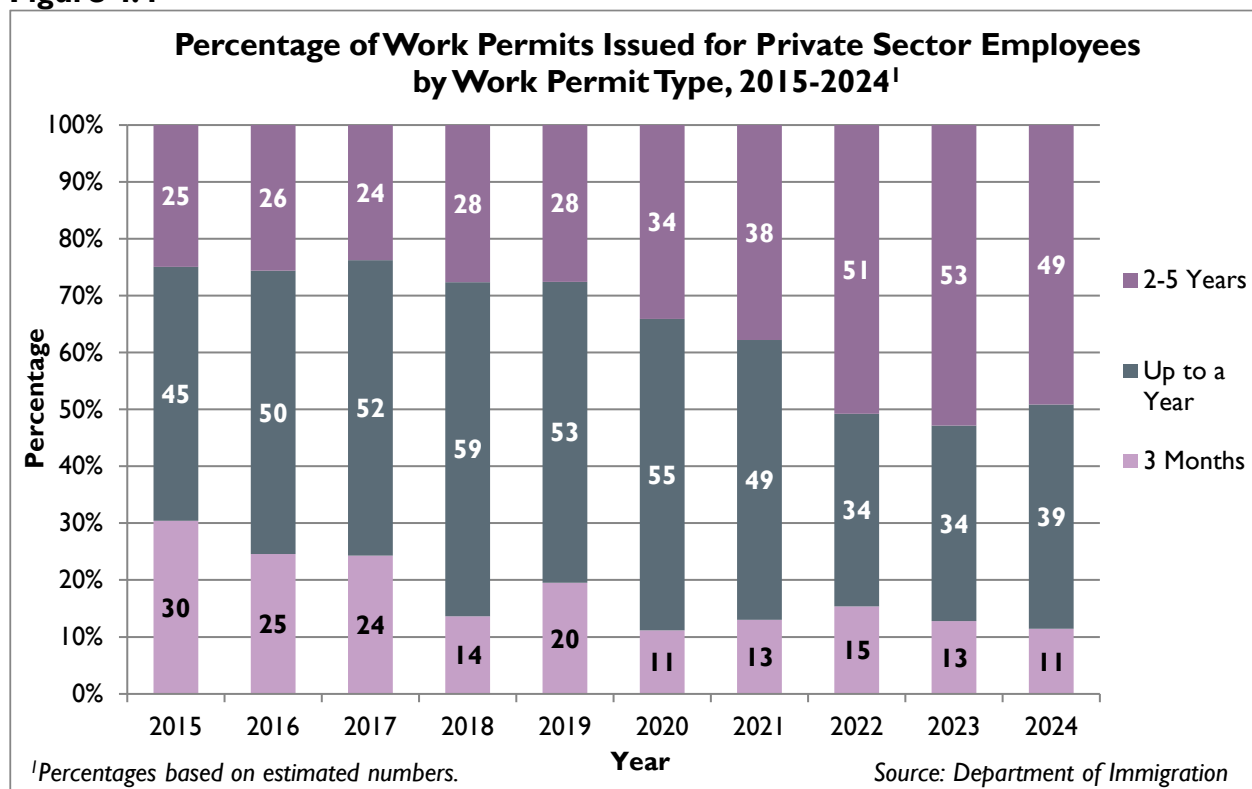




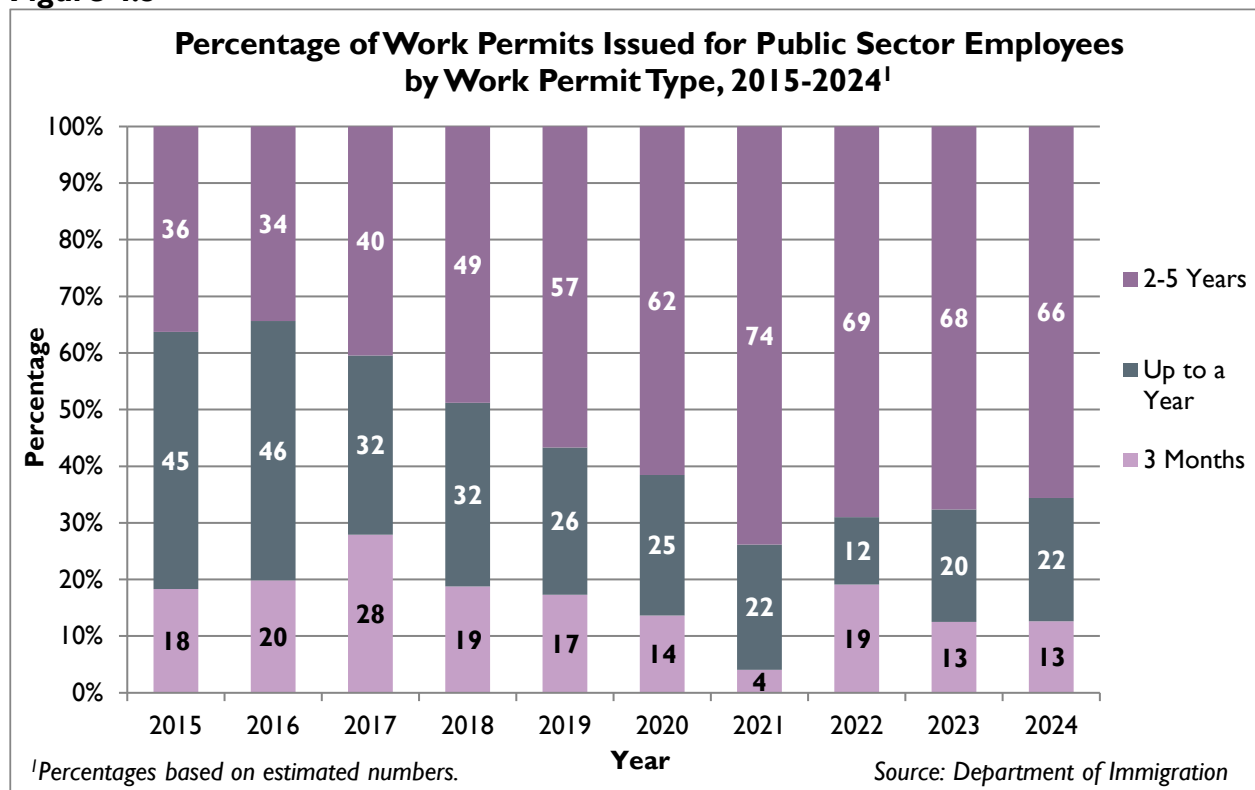
**Figure 4.3**

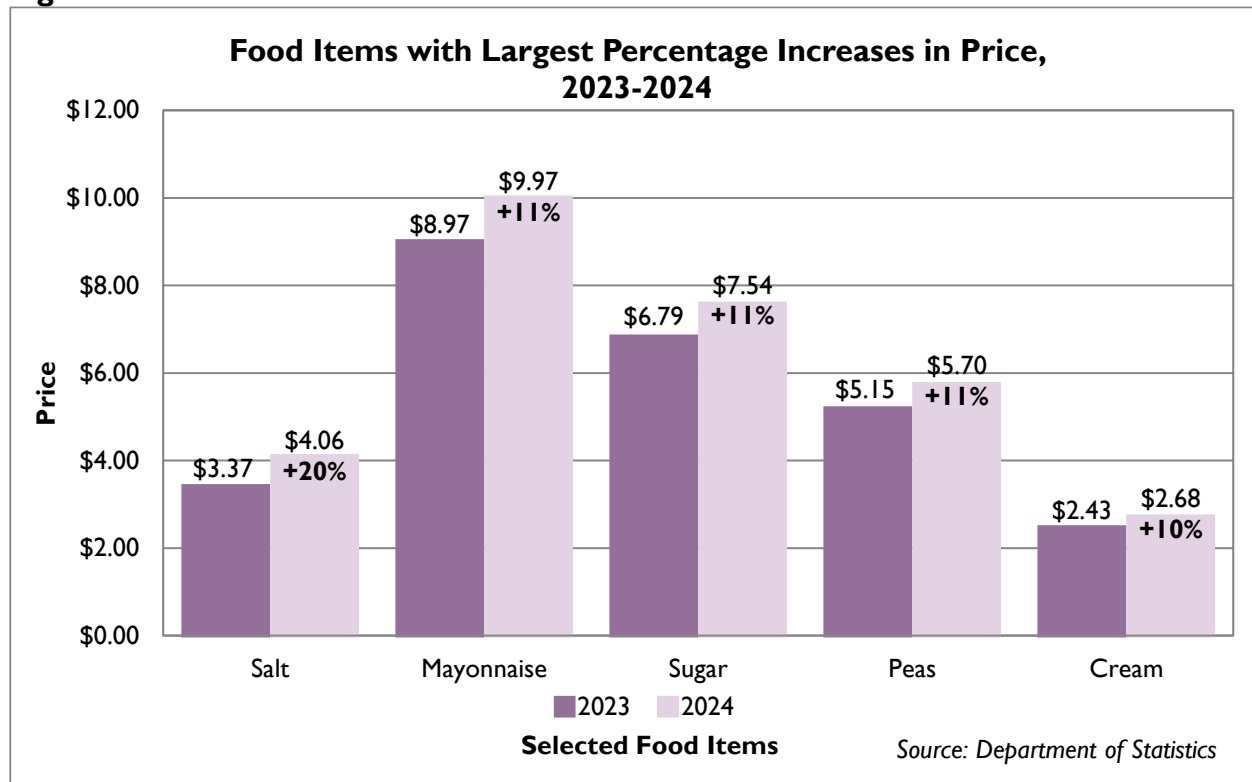

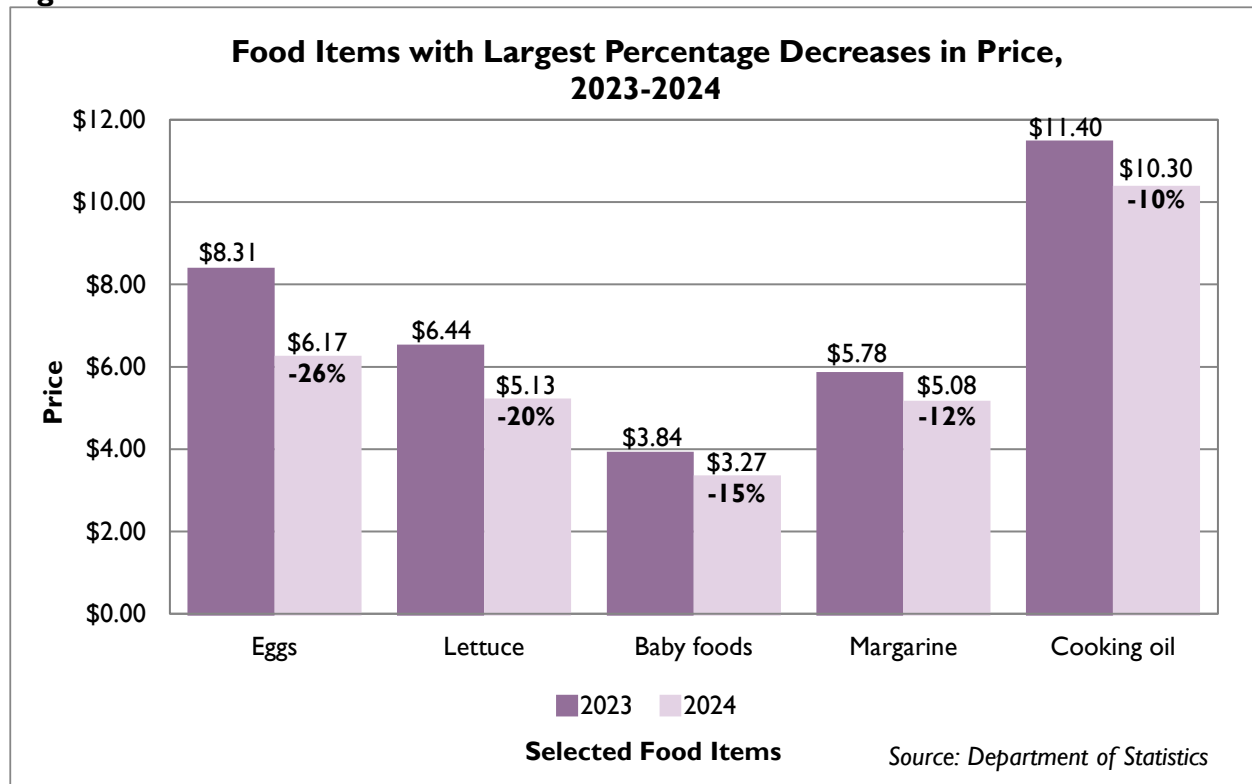

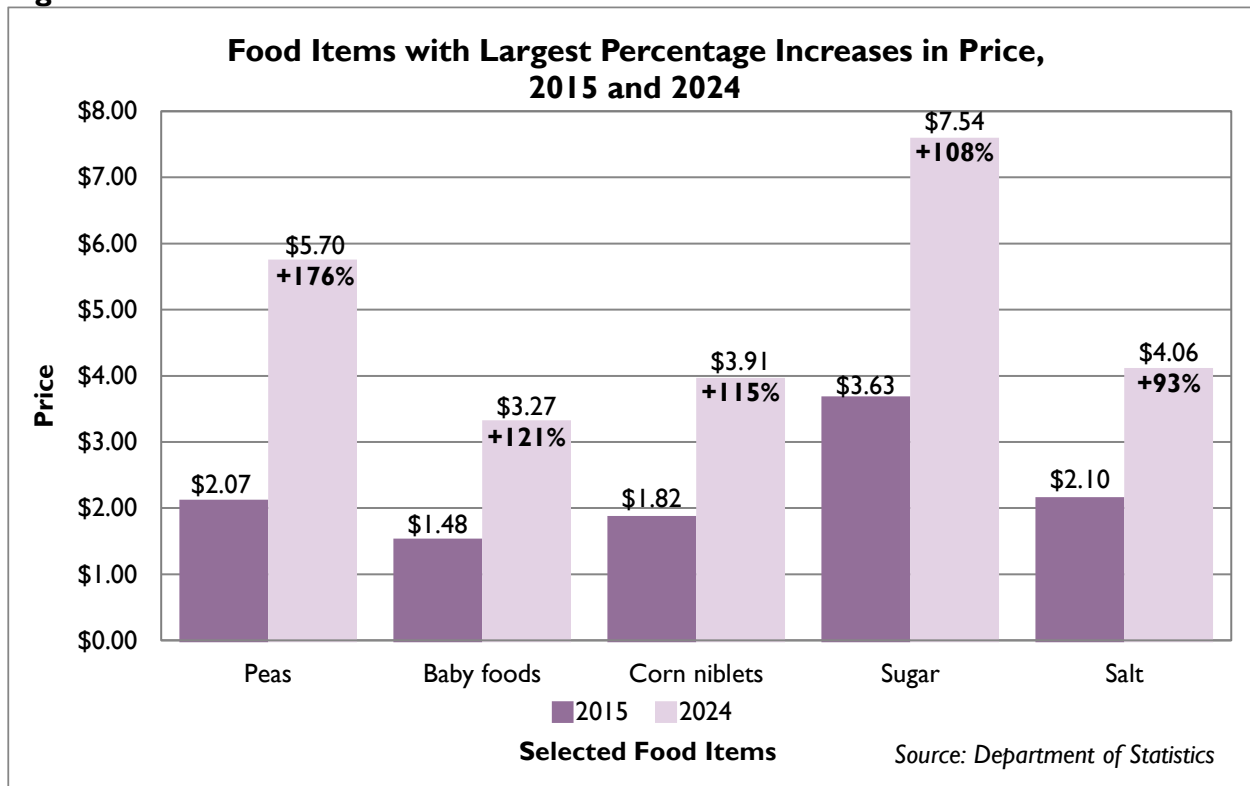


**Figure 5.2**

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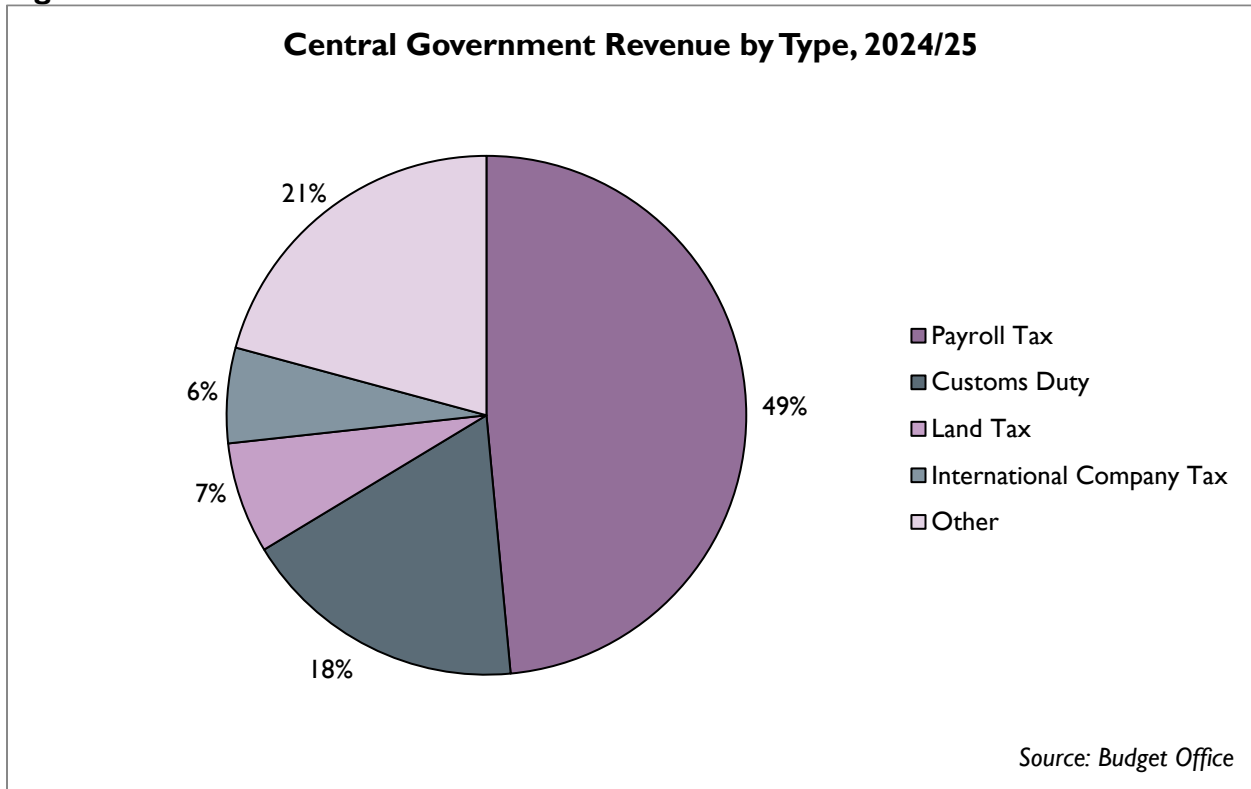

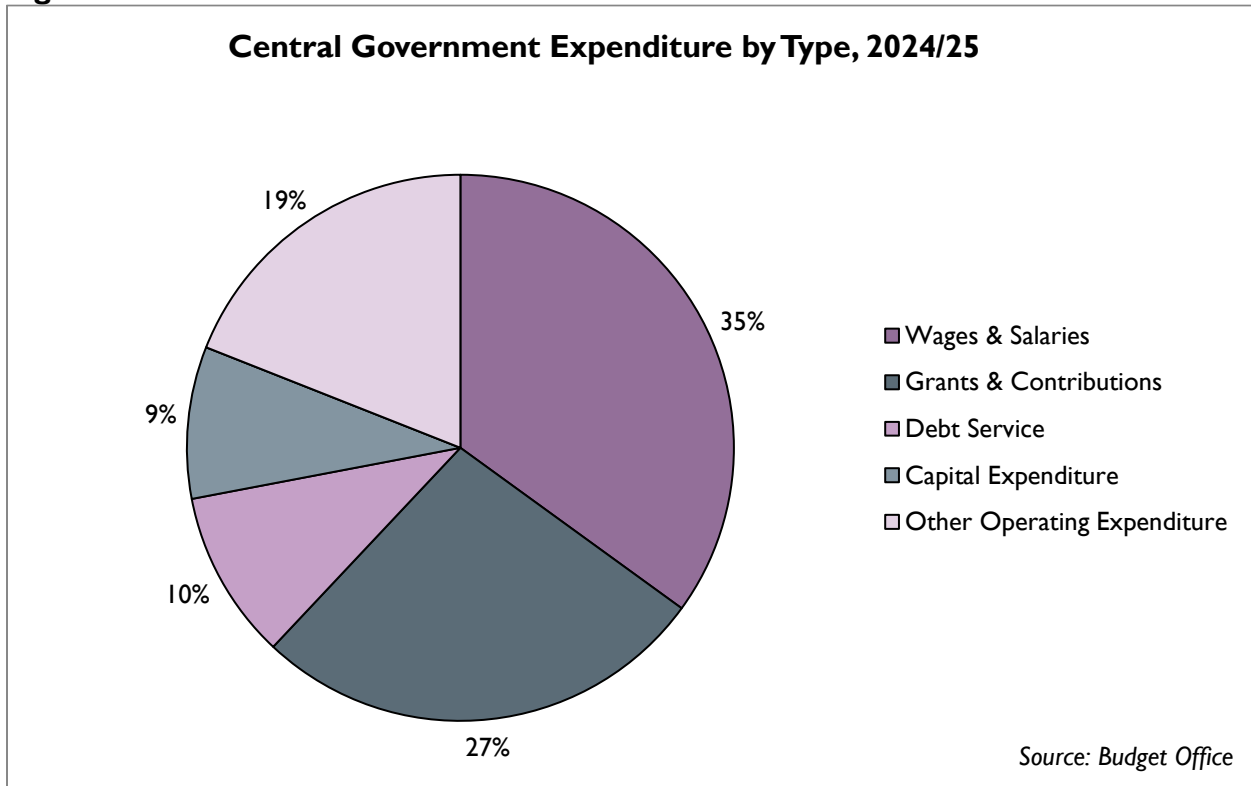

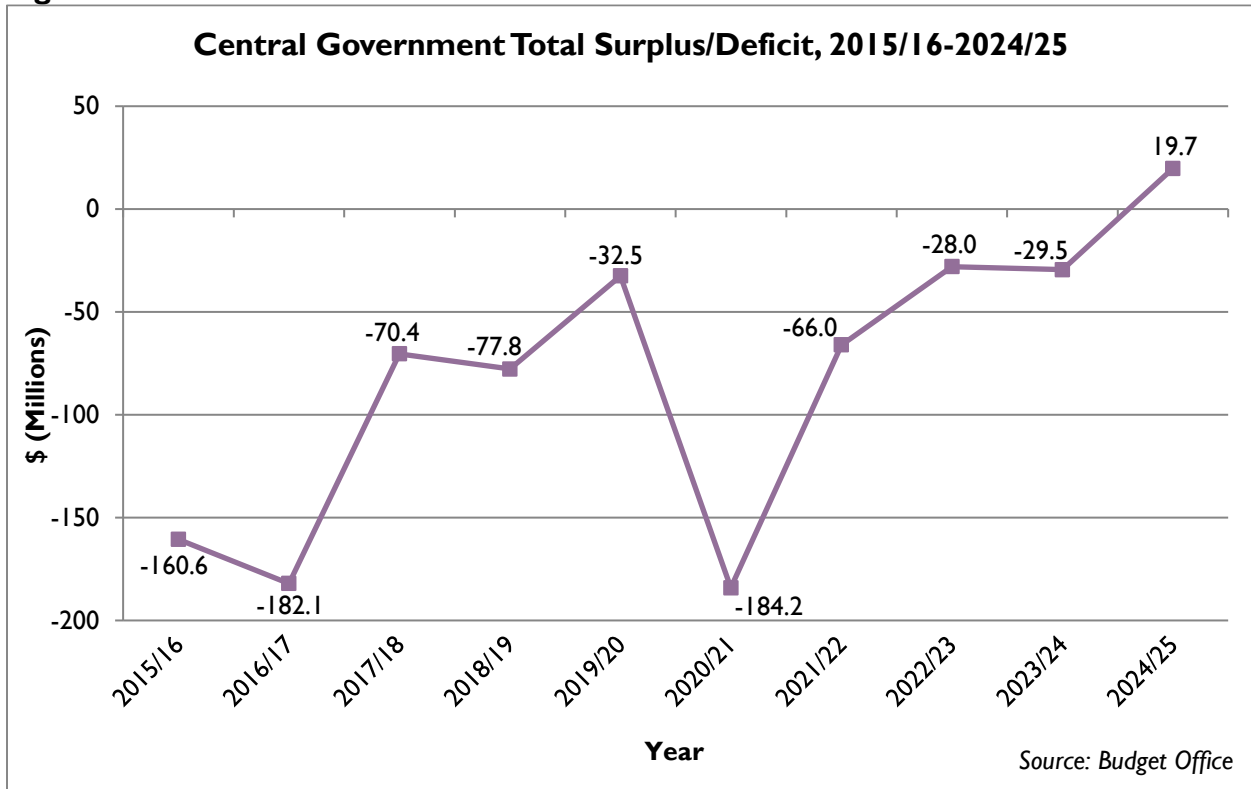
**Figure 6.1**



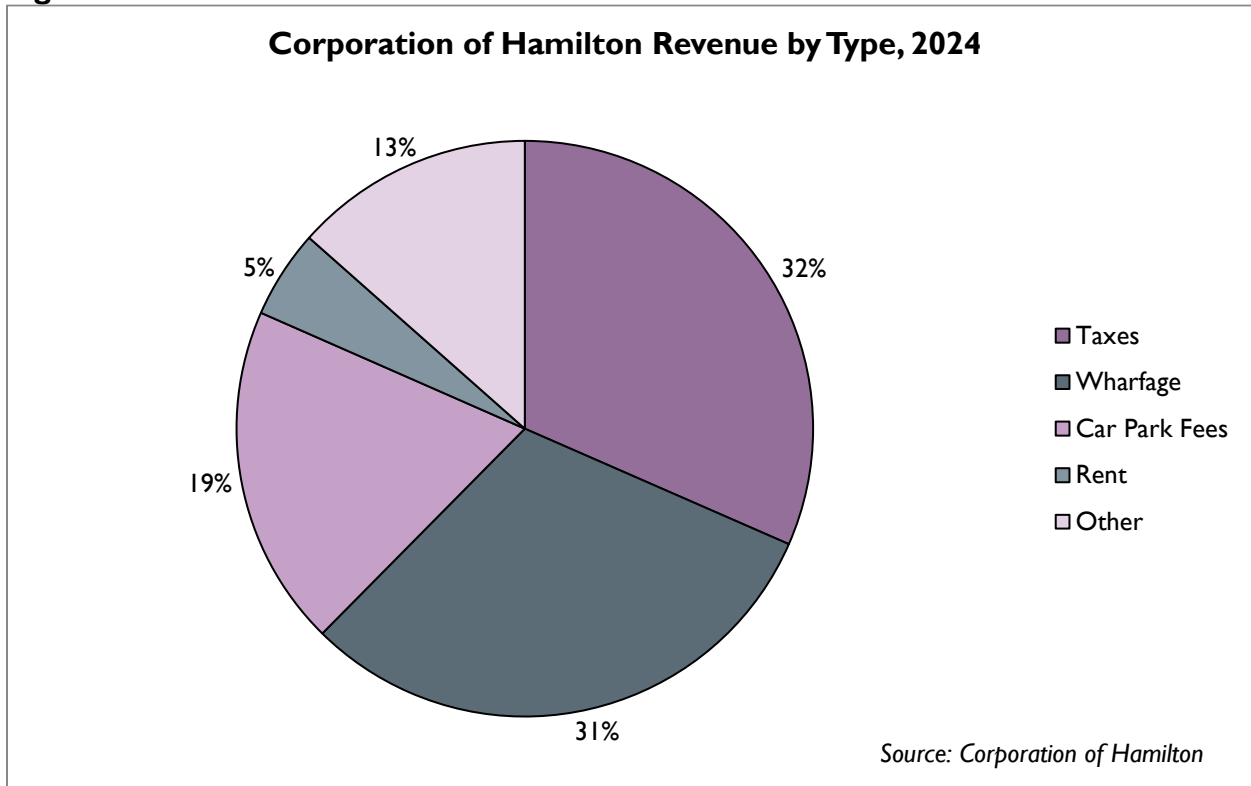
**Figure 6.2**



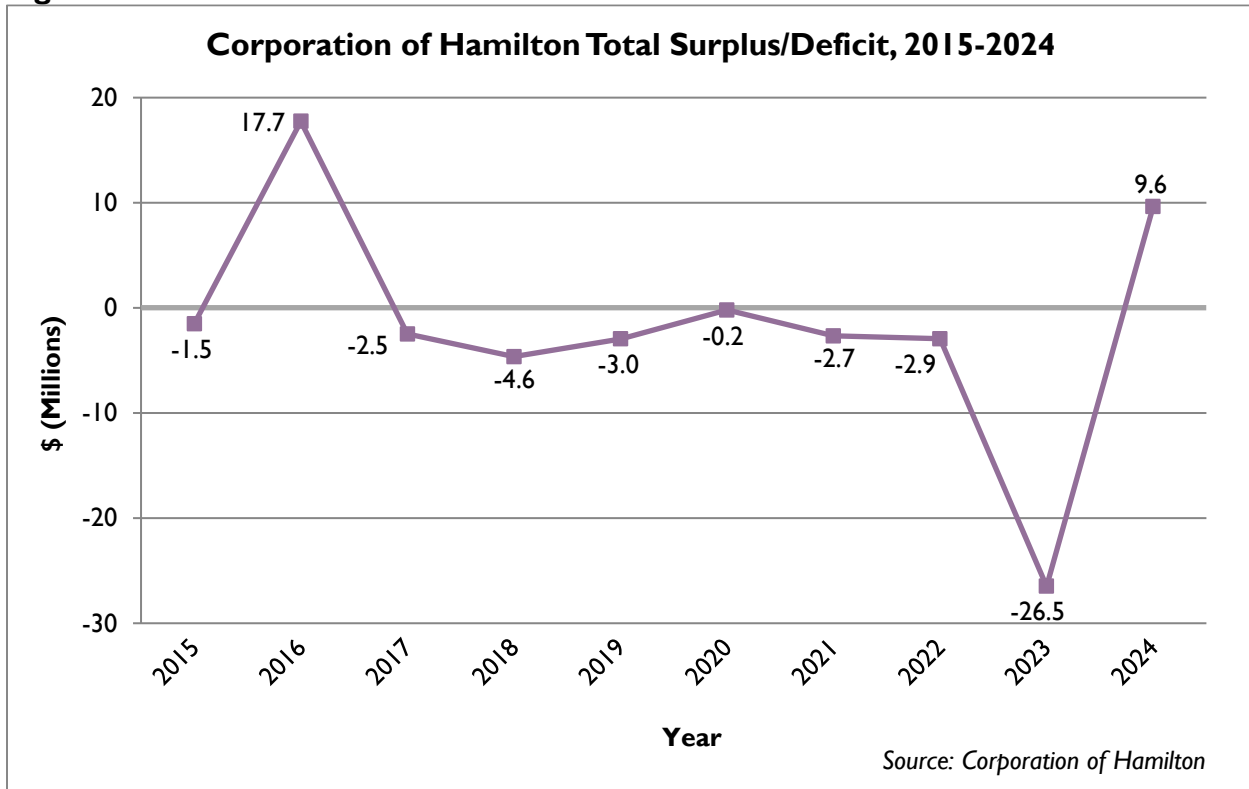
**Figure 6.3**



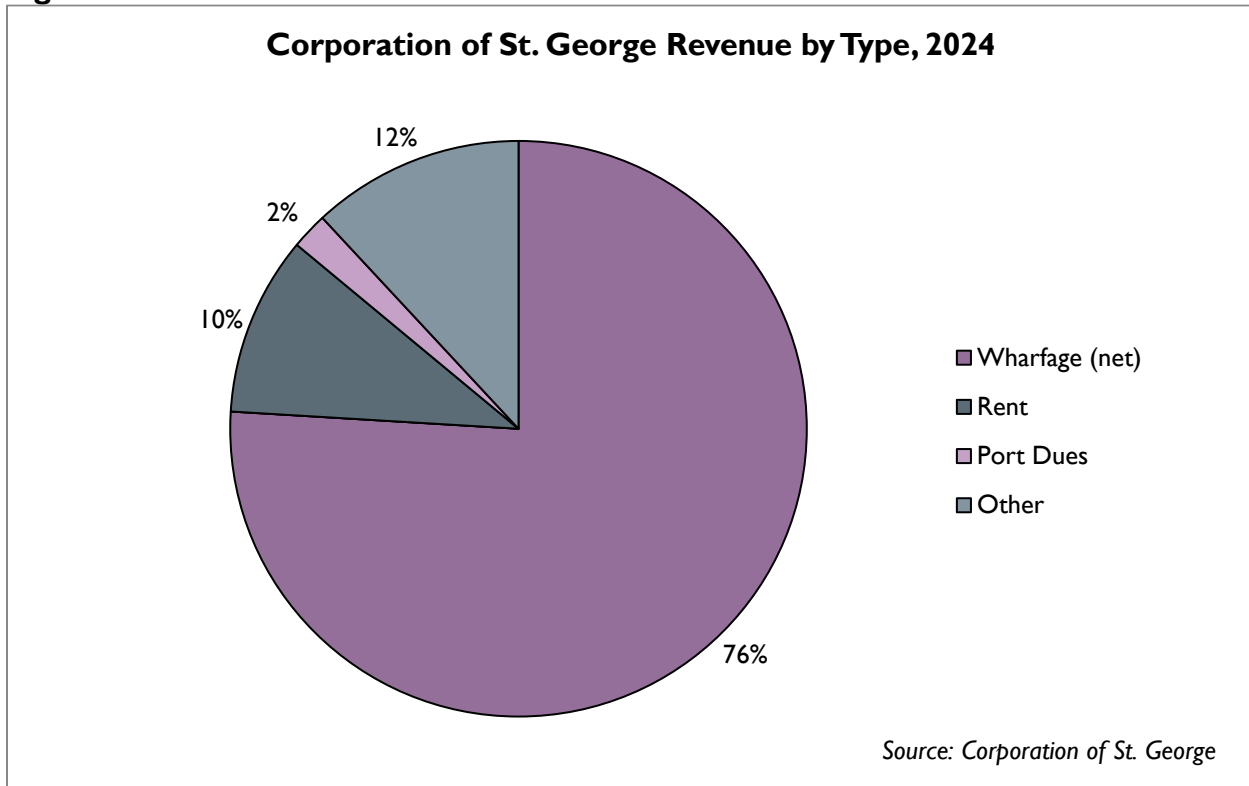
**Figure 6.4**



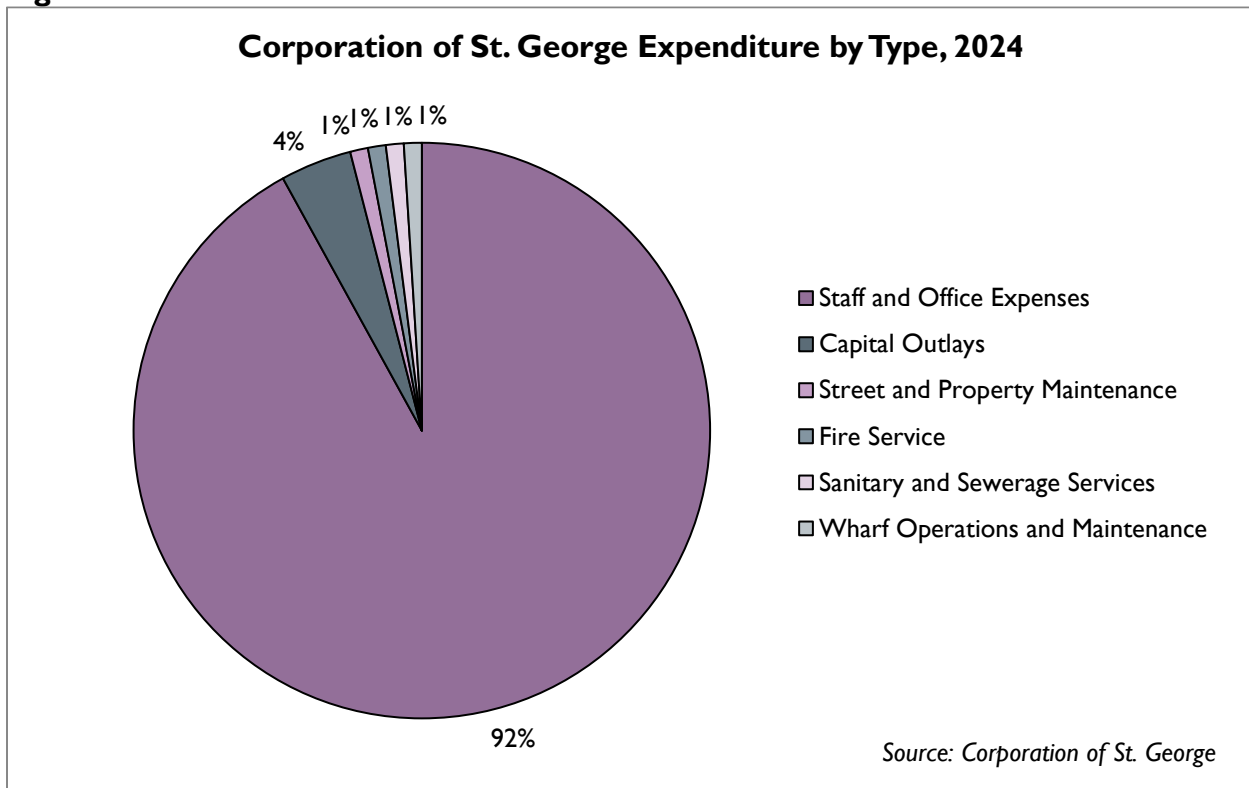
**Figure 6.5**



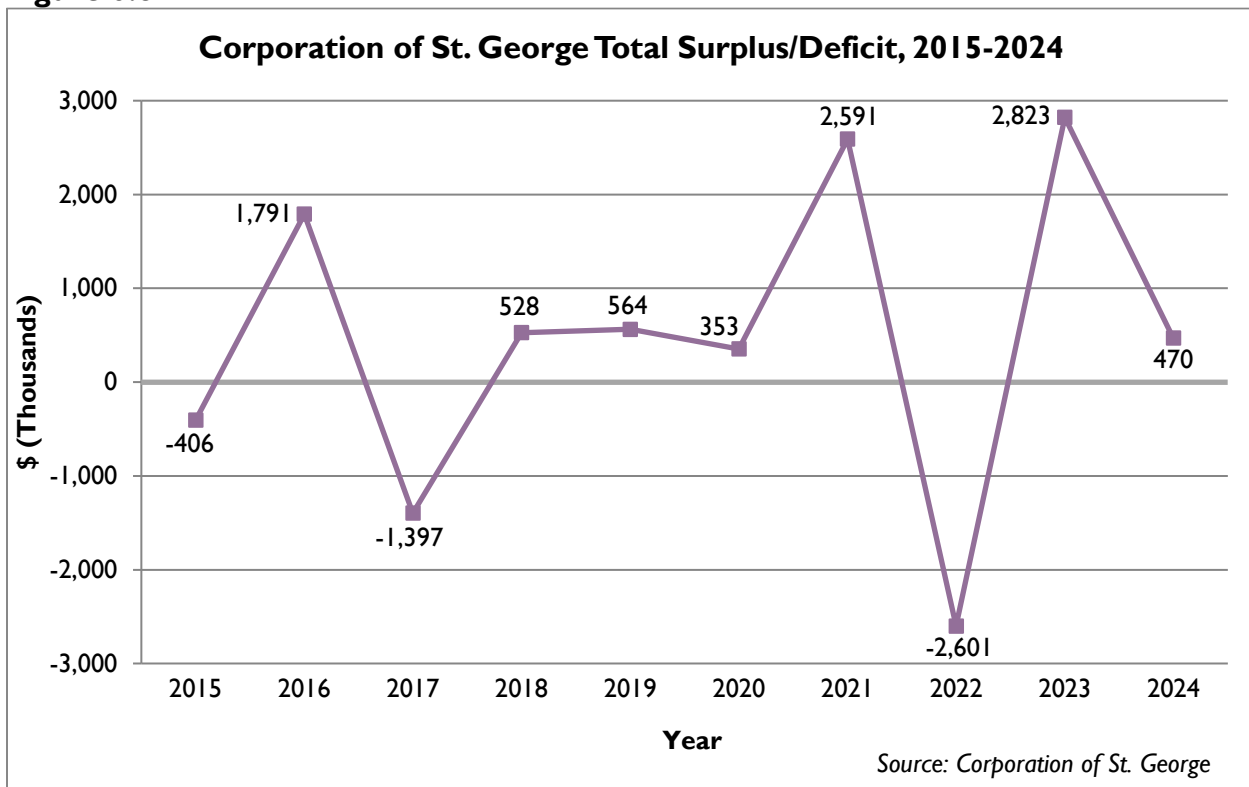
**Figure 6.6**

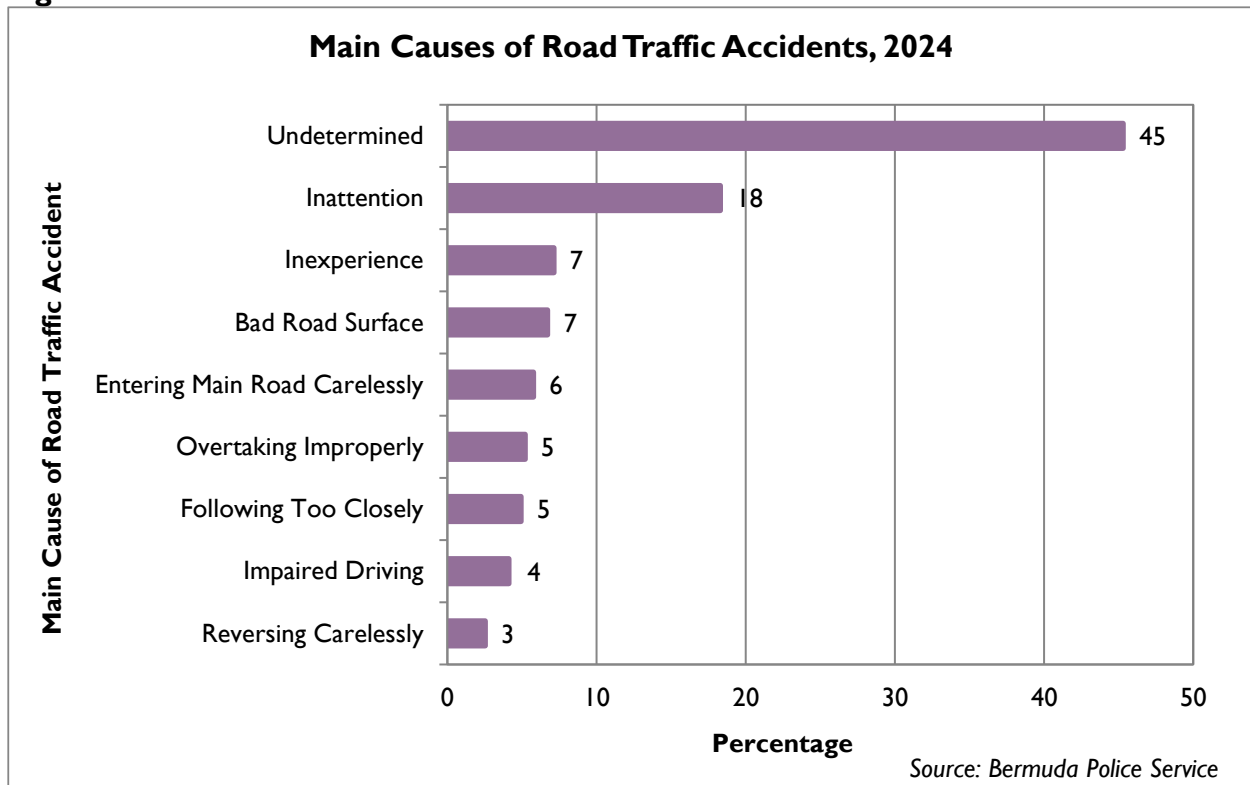




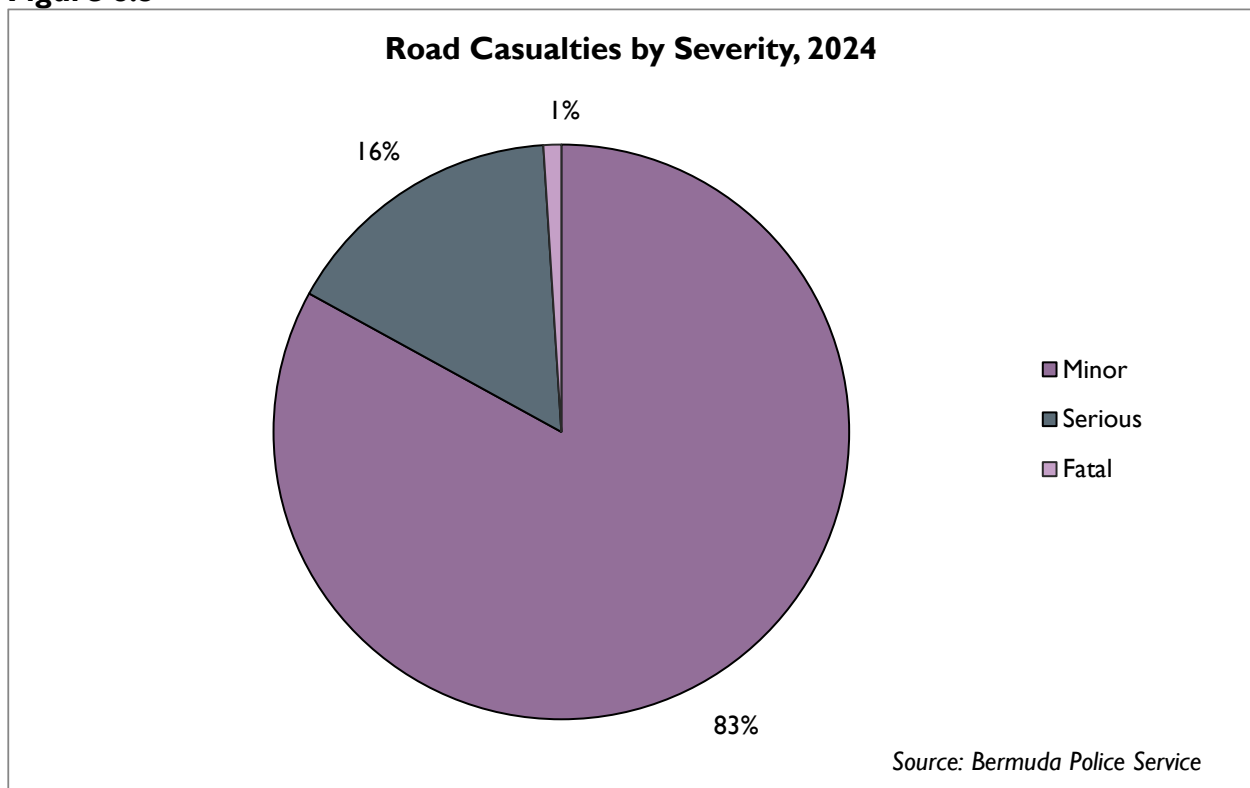
**Figure 8.3**



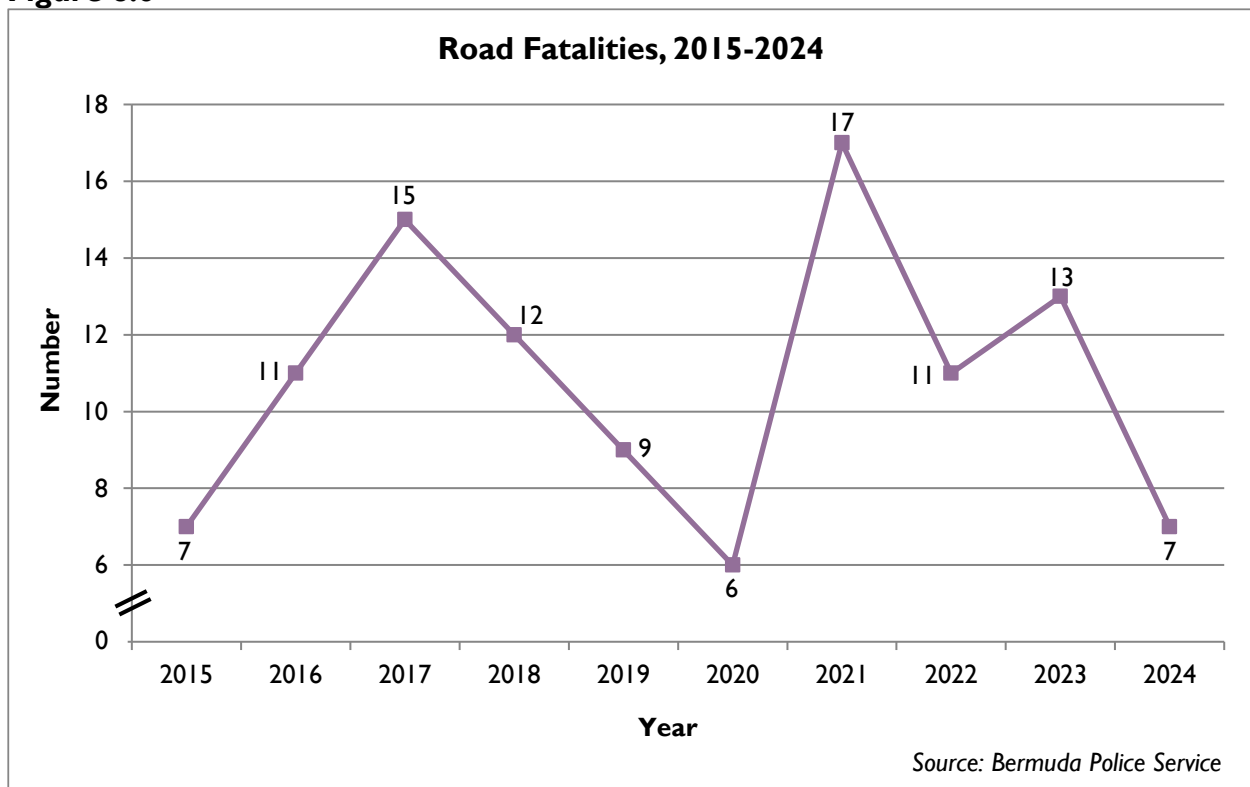
**Figure 8.4**



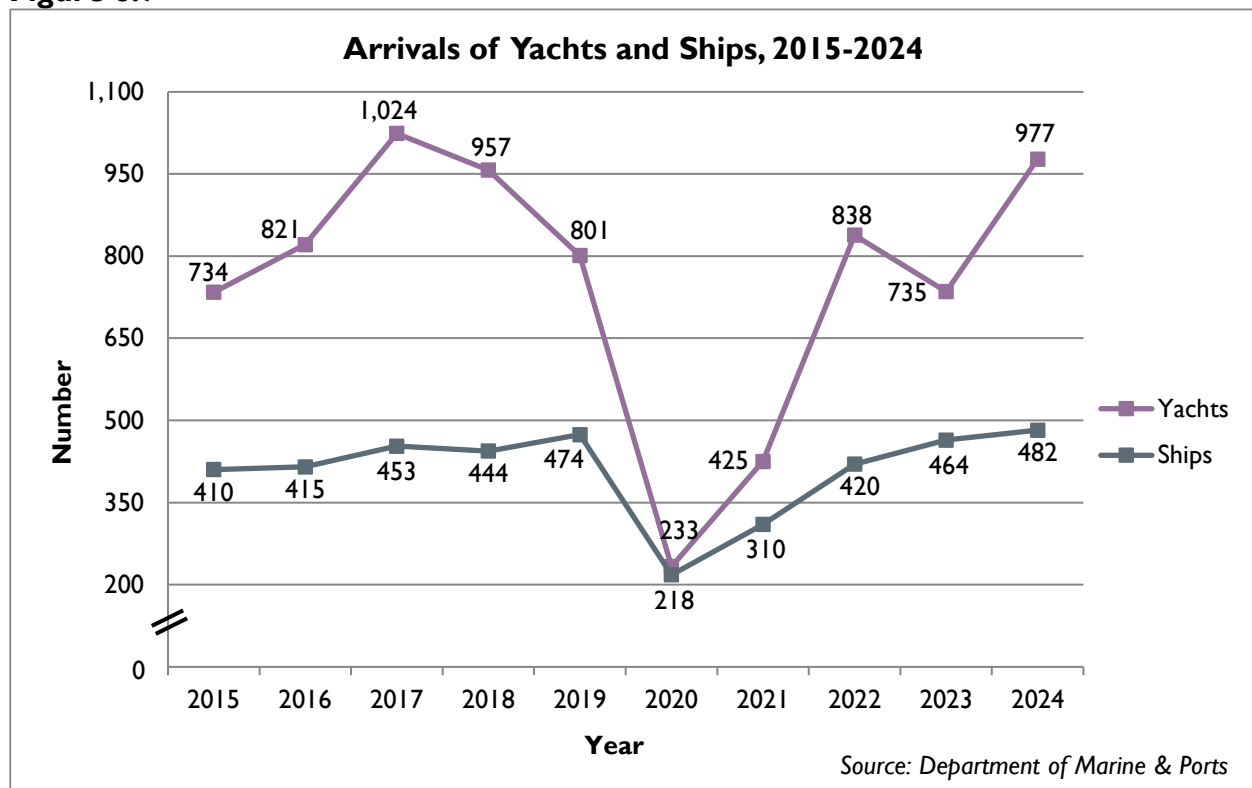
**Figure 8.5**

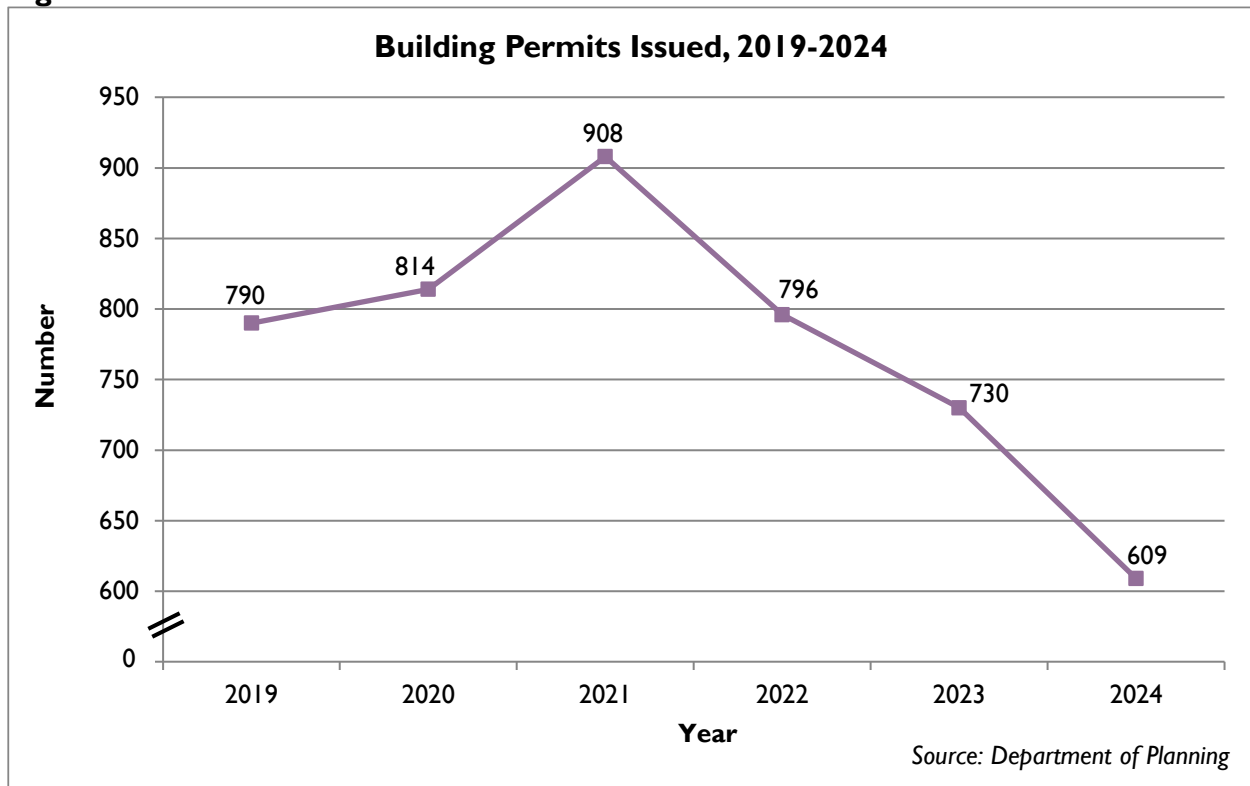


**Figure 10.2**

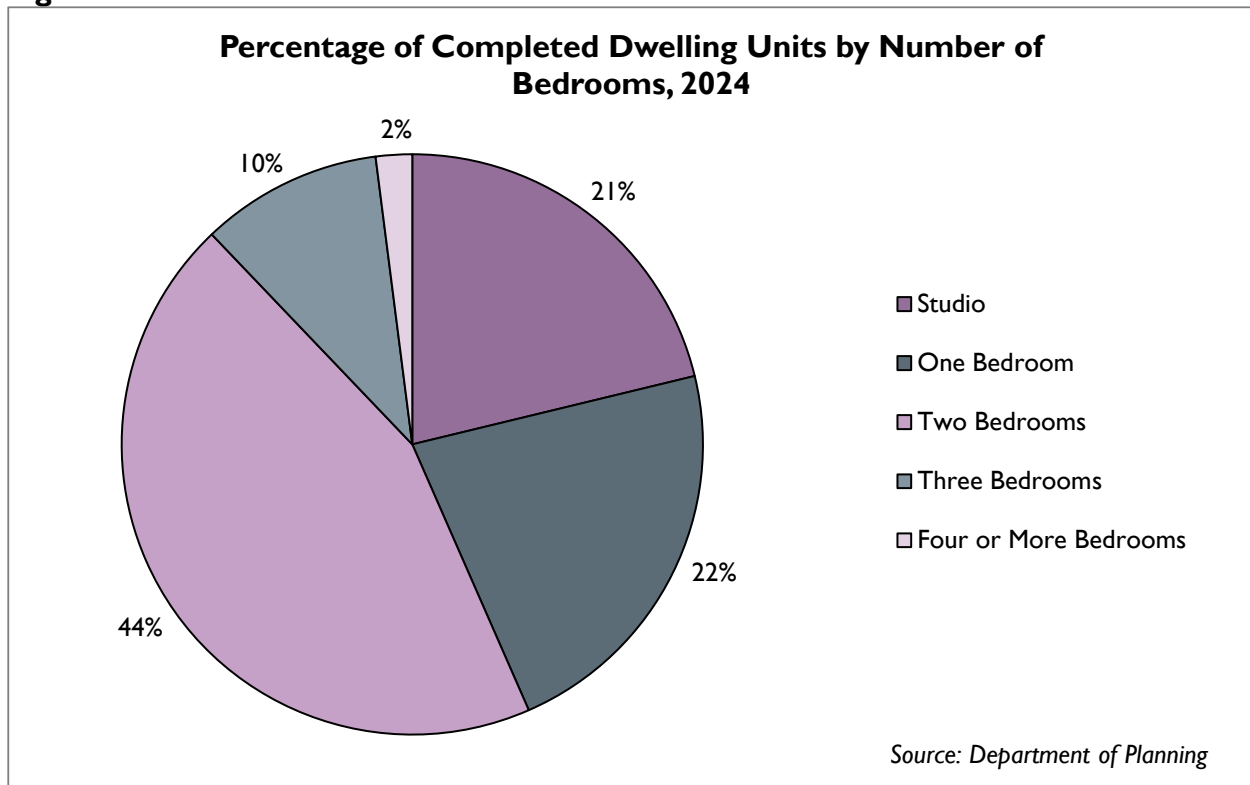




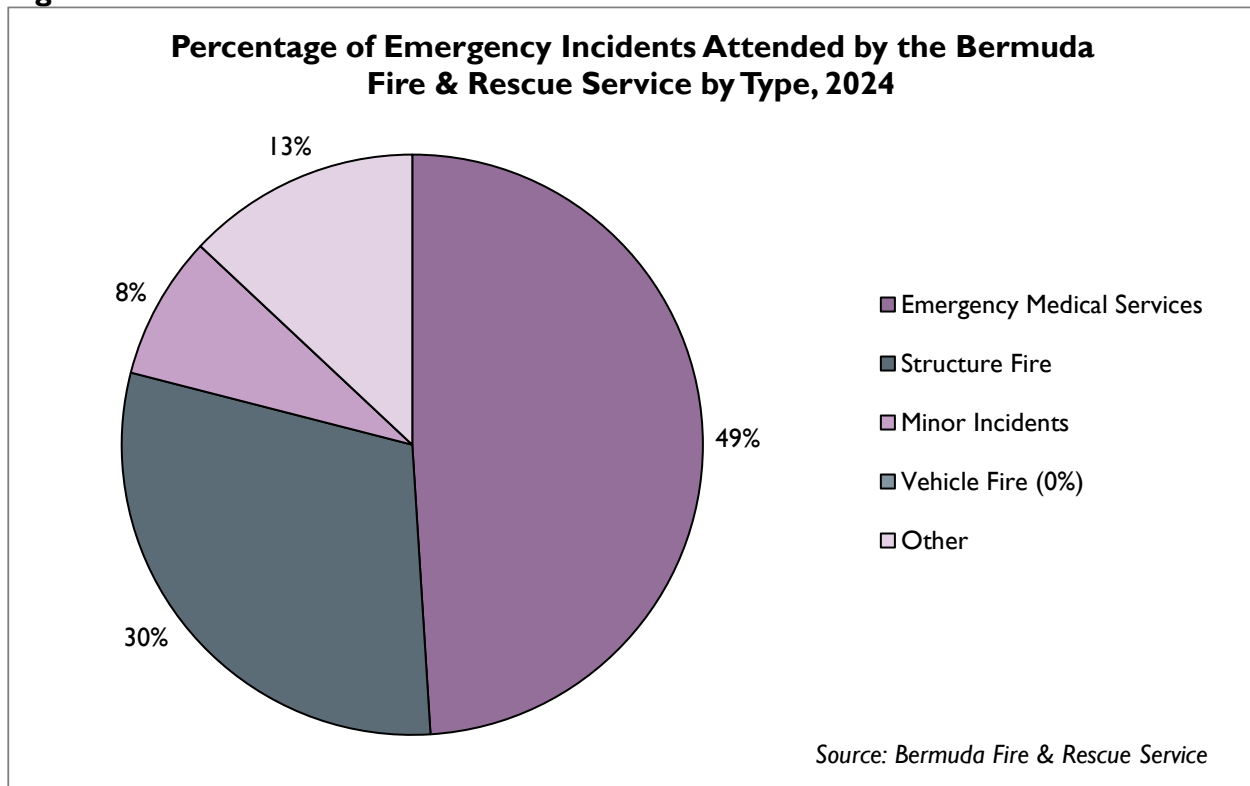
**Figure 10.3**

Apartment House - A residential building that contains three or more dwelling units.
